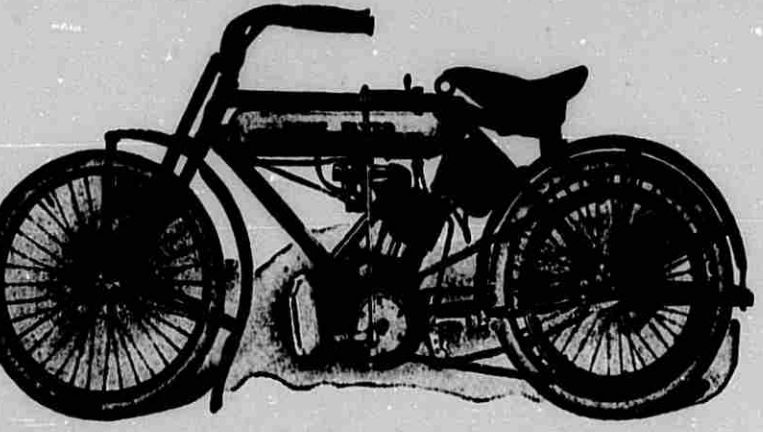

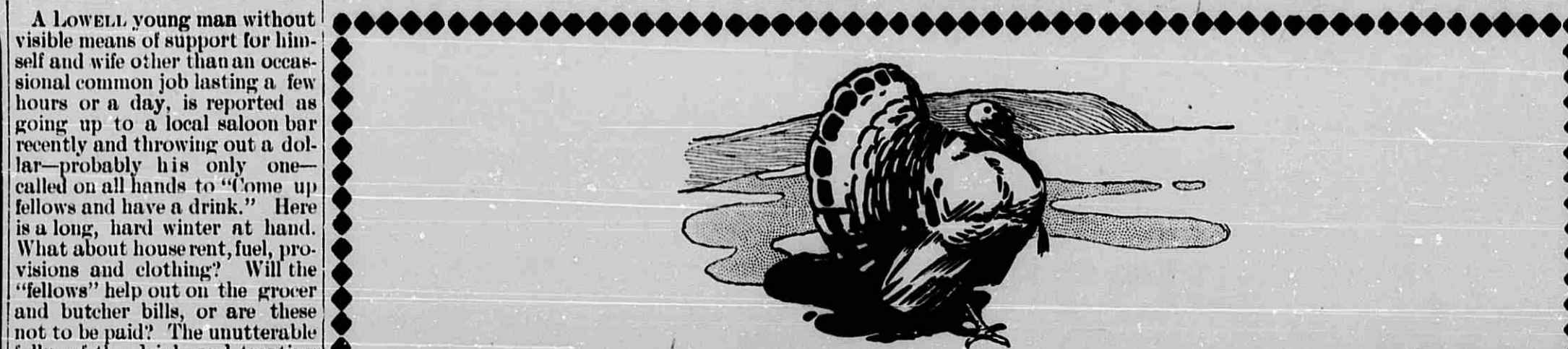

COMPLAINT reaches us that there were eleven drunken men on the streets Saturday evening, some so far gone as to be unable to keep on their feet. 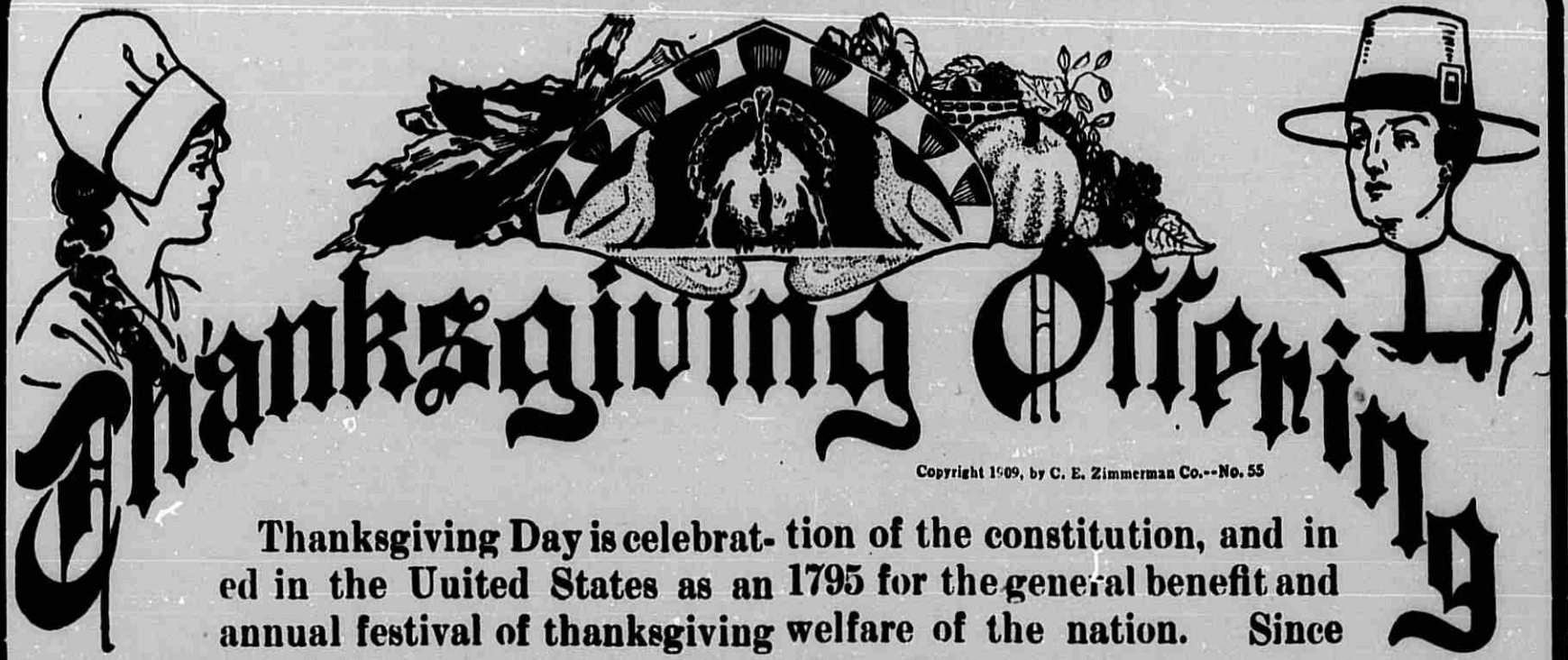
