## A HOWLING BLIZZARD

Struck Lowell Yesterday--Traffic Blocked--Trains Stalled.

One of the wildest wind and snow storms that was ever experienced in old Michigan struck this vicinity yesterday, raging throughout the day and night. A fierce wind that seemed to blow from all directions at once, full of icy snow that cut and stuck, drove all traffic from the streets. Snow banked up against the doors of business places and there was little or no occasion for disturbing it.

None of the Lowell rural route carriers succeeded in making their circuits. Arthur Parker was snow bound fifteen miles out on his route northwest of town. Merrit Savley reached Walter Blakeslee's place in South Lowell at one o'clock yesterday and when last heard from this morning was still there, waiting to be dug out. Maybe he likes the board. Fred Barnes got as far as Al Kne's in Keene and then turned back. Fred says he knows when he's got enough. Laux, Pletcher, Taylor and Fenning all turned back at various stages of the game with horses exhausted by struggling through miles of snow banks.

The railroad trains were all blocked. No evening papers from Grand Rapids last night and no mail this morning. The Grand Trunk 5.34 east bound went through here at 6:30 last night and got stalled at Pawamo. Other trains on both roads are snow bound all along the line.

This Thursday morning at 10 o'clock the drifting of snow seems about over; and it is hoped that trains may get started on their ways during the afternoon.

An amusing freak of the storm last night was to clear the walks on the south side of Main and Bridge streets and pile it up against the doorways of business places on the north side. When shoveled into the gutter a white rampart from six to eight feet high was raised. Superintendent Crampton caused the schools to be closed today on account of the cold and the drifts.

## STUDY THE SOUTH

C. L. C. Program of Booker T. Washington and His Race

The Clover Leaf club met with Mrs. A. M. Andrews Tuesday afternoon, Feb. 20. The program was in charge of Mrs. O. O. Adams, and was opened with a vocal solo by Mrs. E. A. Anderson, "Sleep, My Southern Babe." Mrs. L. R. Andrews then read an interesting paper on "Booker T. Washington and Tuskegee." After giving a sketch of the life of Washington, Mrs. Andrews gave us a brief history of the school which he founded. This school was opened July 4, 1881 in a little shanty with thirty pupils. At the present time there are more than 1200 students and 88 officers and instructors. The institution owns 2300 acres of land over 700 of which are under cultivation. There are over 40 buildings and the value of the property is half a million dollars. The paper closed with a well deserved tribute to Booker T. Washington.

Miss Maynard sang, "The Creole Love Song" and responded to an encore with, "Susanna." The subject of Mrs. VanDyke's paper was "A Day in the South." She gave an account of the rapid growth and development of all kinds of industries in the South. Among the most valuable products of this part of our country are the minerals, timber, oil and cotton. Libraries which a few years ago were very few, have become numerous throughout the Southern states. She mentioned several of the large cities of the South, naming advantages which each contained and noting the progress within the last fifty years, predicts that from 1900 to 1950 the South will be the land of opportunity. Mrs. Merrill then gave a reading, "Pore Little Lamb," a negro lullaby, with piano accompaniment. Mrs. D. B. Davidson, a former member of the club made a few remarks and roll call was responded to with negro superstitions. Mrs. H. L. Weekes was pianist for the day.—[Com.]

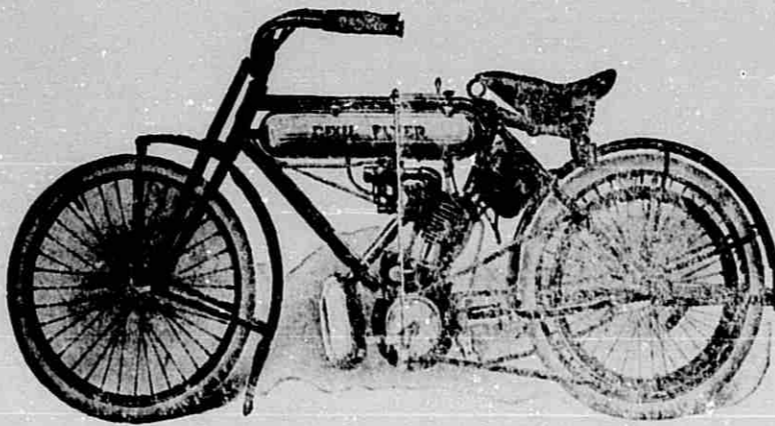
