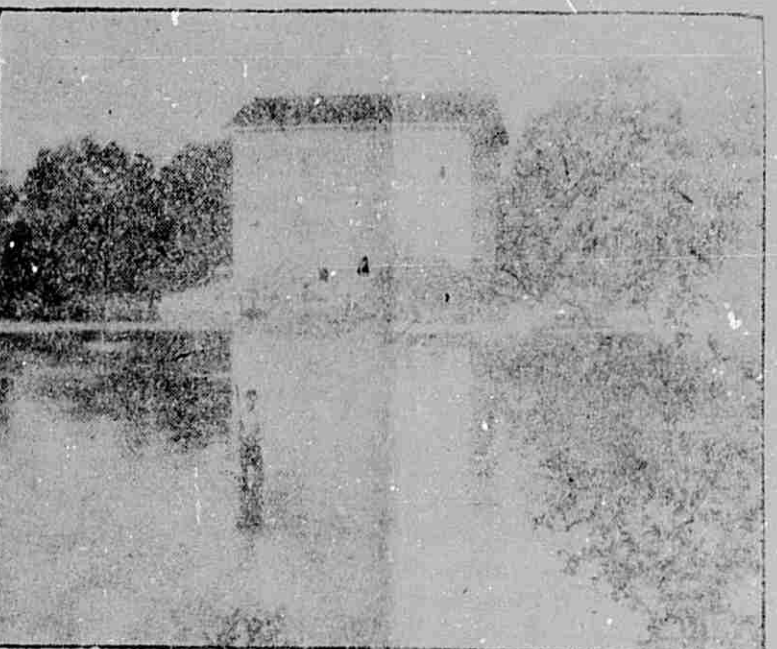

PIONEER MILL GONE ALL THE ADA NEWS

Fallasburg Mill, Relic of Pioneer Days, Destroyed

The old grist mill which has stood as a landmark in Fallasburg for about 73 years, was purchased some time ago by E. F. Wilkinson of Keene and last Saturday the last timbers and plates were taken down and drawn away. It was with some regret that we saw it moved, and the site where once stood a flourishing emblem of the busy grist, day after day, with the rush of business from the surrounding country, has a quiet and desolate appearance and we miss the old mill.

In 1837 the first and oldest pioneer was Westley Fallas, who came alone from his home in New York state to this place, then a wilderness, to establish a home in the West as it was called in early days, and Michigan about this time was admitted to the Union. Mr. Fallas built this first grist mill as there was none at that time nearer than Ionia and Grand Rapids. A quarter interest was purchased by the grandfather of Emerson Davenport and in 39 when Mr. Fallas who went East to be married, returned, the mill was ready for operation and began at once doing business.

In 1845 Mrs. Wilbur Moon with her parents came from New York and her oldest brother, William A. Fallas bought out the Davenport interest and the mill was run day and night doing a bustling business. Mrs. Moon's father made trip day to Grand Rapids and return with the flour, 9 barrels at a load, averaging about four trips a week. At this time Fallasburg could boast of two stores, one blacksmith shop, one shoe shop, the grist mill and near the latter and just north of it Mr. Fallas built a saw mill using the same water power, a turning lathe was added and furniture being made. This was the only mill of its kind from Ionia to Grand Rapids until a little later one was built by Simon Welsh three miles west of the former place. At such a time and place as this, a man starting in alone as Mr. Fallas did, deserves great credit for undertaking such an enterprise.

It may seem strange to the reader of this article, but supplies from here were sold to the new settlers of Lowell which was then but an Indian village and many a time the celebrations and good times were witnessed in this place. The sawmill was afterwards sold to Charles Hexco who lived here and after all the logs along Flat river were cut and sawed into timber, it was taken down about 1872 and its owner, Mr. Hexco moved to Greenville. At the time Mr. Fallas came here first and built the grist mill, his nearest and only neighbor was Rex Robinson, father of Luke Robinson who now lives on the old homestead just beyond Bisby bridge to the left about three miles distant.

The removing of the old grist mill, will no doubt bring many reminiscences both of joy and sadness to the early settlers of this and surrounding vicinity and its removal closes the career of its 73 years standing and proves the old saying, "everything has an end."

TWO FAMILIES LOSE

Nathan Lynn Falls Thro' Roof of Burning House.

Fire caused by gasoline stove Friday evening, practically destroyed the one-story frame house on Main street west of Mr. George Speaker's, owned by W. W. Wilson of Kalamazoo and occupied by the families of Walter Scrambling and Nathan Lynn. Mr. Lynn climbed to the roof with water and the timbers gave way with him, letting him fall through to the floor below. His head and shoulders were slightly bruised though he was not injured by fire. He was temporarily taken to the auto factory, and later the family went to the home of Mrs. Lynn's mother, Mrs. A. N. Burr, on the hill. Mrs. Scrambling was consulting after an operation for appendicitis, but fortunately did not suffer from the effects of the sudden removal. Mr. and Mrs. Scrambling have moved into Mrs. Beadle's house on the addition.

Neither family had any insurance on their household goods, and only about one-third of the property of other was saved. The fire broke out about five o'clock p. m. The stove having flared up while Mrs. Lynn was preparing supper, and the building being old, it was soon demolished, though the fire department succeeded in preventing injury to Mrs. Speaker's home, which almost adjoins it.

YOUNG BOY IS CALLED.

Miles Arthur Ritinger, second son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. She leaves, besides the daughter, four sons: James, living on his farm adjoining the homestead in Vergennes; Robert B. of West Lowell; John and Charles of Rodgers, N. Dak. The four sons were present at the funeral and acted as pall bearers.

The action of the State Grange in endorsing local option may have represented to some extent the sympathies and the desire for the good of others on the part of some members of the organization who did not know through practical experience as to the local option results. Here however, it is a result of the action of members of a grange every one of whom lives in local option territory and who know from their most four years of practical experience what they are talking about. It is a resolution adopted Feb. 6 by the Michigan State Grange at its annual convention at East Lansing, 1922. Whereas, the Michigan State Grange has placed itself on record as opposed to the local option and has endorsed local option as the most available way out at hand to the local option farmer (taxpayer) and the local option county has tried local option four years last year and the members of this grange have seen the practical results of the law and know that it is a vast improvement upon conditions as they existed before the local option law, be it resolved by Assembly No. 1202 that we endorse the action of the State Grange in endorsing local option and that this grange is in favor of a "dry" county and recommend farmers to unite in voting dry at the coming election.
