KENT COUNTY FOR ROOSEVELT

65 Men Named to the Fifth District Convention

Senator William Alden Smith, Governor Osborn and Amos Musselman endorsed and approved in Resolutions Adopted

Kent county Republicans Tuesday held their second county convention for the purpose of declaring a presidential preference and in a fiery session which never knew a dull moment from 11 a. m. to 4 p. m., for a second time swung out squarely for Theodore Roosevelt for the Chicago nomination.

This is what the convention did in a nut shell—although the epitome is tame compared with the story of what happened by way of prelude to the accomplished result:

Sent 65 delegates to the district convention, pledged to support district delegates to the Chicago convention who will vote for Roosevelt as long as his name is before the convention.

Pledged these 65 delegates to support Claude T. Hamilton of Grand Rapids and Fred W. Green of Ionia as the two Fifth district Roosevelt delegates; and Melvin McPherson as alternate.

Passed resolutions warmly complimenting Governor Osborn for his administration and endorsing Amos S. Musselman of Grand Rapids as his successor.

Passed resolutions heartily complimenting United States Senator William Alden Smith for his congressional and senatorial record and commending him to the state for re-election.

Passed resolutions endorsing the work of the Kent delegation in the special sessions of the legislature.

The next chapter in the story will be written Thursday when the district convention meets in Grand Rapids. In view of the Kent result yesterday, there can be no question as to the result tomorrow. Mr. Hamilton and Mr. Green will be the Fifth district delegates to Chicago, under Roosevelt instructions and Mr. McPherson will be one of the alternates.

The Roosevelt victory came after a bitter contest through which Taft forces, led on the floor by Colin P. Campbell of Walker, fought every inch of the way. In the early stages of the proceedings there was much personal attack and several personal encounters came near resulting in blows. But in the end, after the Roosevelt forces had demonstrated a clear control of the convention, there was considerable talk of "harmony" (and there was considerable of it, too) although a better description would have been to call it "benevolent assimilation."

BOULEVARD LIGHTS THE STONES FLEW

Council Committee Buys Fifty Posts for Lowell System.

The Village Council Light & Power committee, W. S. Winegar, E. A. Thomas and H. L. Weekes, accompanied by Superintendent F. J. McMahon were in Grand Rapids Monday to confer with C. J. Litscher, who has the contract for the boulevard lighting posts for Grand Rapids as authorized by the council. They placed with him an order for fifty posts at \$38.25 per. These are about the same as those ordered by the city except that the latter have the arms bearing the lamps turned up, whereas those preferred by the Lowell committee as better suited to our purpose, turn down. Each post bears a 60 watt lamp in the center and four 40 watt lamps on the cross arms.

The committeemen who visited Battle Creek, Marshall and other places in quest of Light on the boulevard lighting system are enthusiastic in its praise.

Now with our new City hall, when the wires are underground, the old poles gone, Main and Bridge streets paved, and the boulevard lighting system installed, Lowell will be entitled to a home-coming in 1914 that will be a hummer.

GET LIBRARY FUND

\$6,000 to Be Apportioned Among School Districts

The apportionment of the library fund among the various districts in Kent county in which there are libraries has been sent by the state department of instruction to Deputy Treasurer Gerrit Nevenzel, and within the next two weeks the district libraries will receive amounts ranging from \$30 to \$4,000.

Yearly a certain part of fines in criminal cases is turned in to the city treasurer and set aside for what is known as the library fund. Yearly the state department of public instruction advises the county clerk of the number of children attending school in districts where there are public libraries. According to the per capita rate, which this year is 14c, the money is distributed and goes to help defray the general expense of libraries. The total amount to be distributed in the county is \$5,958.62. There are 42,563 pupils attending school.

The apportionment is as follows: City, \$4,152.26; Ada, \$55.30; Algona, \$83.86; Alpine, \$82.04; Bowne, \$36.26; Byron, \$90.30; Caledonia, \$61.18; Cannon, \$40.60; Cascade, \$55.30; Courtland, \$35.42; Gaines, \$46.90; Grand Rapids, \$135.24; Grattan, \$38.22; Lowell, \$108.50; Nelson, \$104.16; Oakfield, \$20.58; Paris, \$103.88; Plainfield, \$66.72; Sparta, \$93.52; Spencer, \$36.96; Tyrone, \$60.90; Vergennes, \$41.44; Walker, \$101.64; Wyoming, \$265.02. Total, \$5,958.62.—(Herald.)

A small midnight robbery was committed in the Pere Marquette yards in this village Sunday night, two cars having been broken into though only a handful of automobile tools were taken. The cars were part of a train which was waiting on the siding, the one a car of beans consigned to Chicago and the other one of a number of automobile cars going to various points. Six bags of beans, evidently the only ones disturbed, were found lying near the track and an automobile tool-box originally containing sixteen tools was found in a nearby pile of ties with ten of the tools missing. An auto pump from the car was hidden with the box, and it is believed the marauders became alarmed and fled suddenly. A special officer of the Pere Marquette road was in town Monday investigating the matter, but as yet no clue to the identity of the thieves has been found.

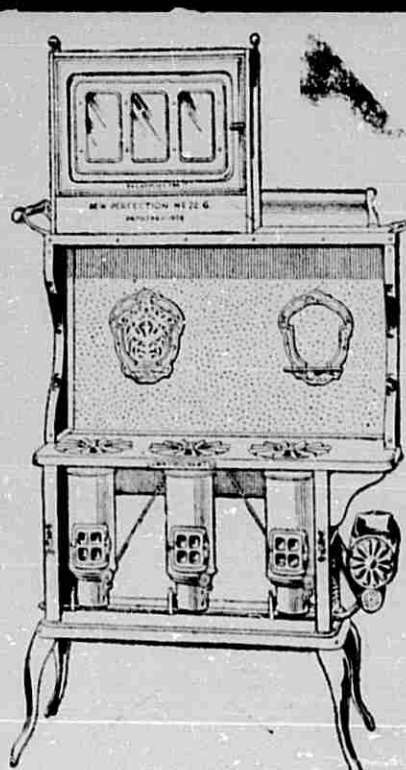

MAKES DARING TRIP

W. P. Edwards of Reclamation Service Has Thrilling Adventure.

Dr. Alexander Campbell gave a stereopticon lecture last night at Coldbrook school on the fly extermination campaign. He described and showed views of breeding places of flies and explained methods of exterminating them. He told how the old-time feather duster simply chased the dust from one place in the house to another, and how the vacuum cleaner today removes the dust once and for all. He also compared the present day methods of dealing with rats and mosquitoes, with the lax methods employed in other days by people in general.

Dr. Campbell described the successful campaigns in Baltimore and Worcester, and spoke also of the fly extermination campaign waged in Cleveland from April 22 to May 5. The slides used in the lecture were prepared and loaned to the Grand Rapids Anti-Tuberculosis society by Professor C. F. Hooge of Worcester, Mass.—(Grand Rapids Herald, May 15).
