PALISADE, COLORADO, May 21, 1912.

Lowell, Mich.

Friend Johnson: Enclosed I hand you my check for \$1.00 to pay for Ledger as per your statement received.

It is the biggest dollars worth that I get. Wish you would suggest to your reporter from section No. 2 (that is the old home news) to give us news every week. If any Lowellites anticipate a Western trip, tell them they can get into this valley a little later and make expenses for the trip in a short time. It will take about two thousand helpers to take care of the crop. They pay men 25c to 35c an hour for picking and good packers get 2% to 3c a box and can pack from 150 to 300 boxes a day. So you can see where they would come out if they should stay 30 days.

If 5 or 6 boys would like to come out they could live in their tent, have a splendid vacation, see some of the most beautiful mountain scenery in the United States and earn their expenses.

Our board of trade (which is a good one) is now taking up the help question. We have a committee that co-operate with the shippers association, also the growers committees and will arrange to take care of (feed and sleep) this vast army of helpers. We are in good health out here and things look good for the coming season.
