DIED IN HIS CHAIR

Kendrick Taylor's Peaceful Passing. Was 83 Years Old.

Kendrick Taylor aged 83, was found dead in his chair, at his home just north of the Methodist church, this village, Monday afternoon about four-twenty, sudden death being the result of heart trouble. Funeral services were held at the house yesterday afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by Rev. L. E. Lennox D. D., and burial was made in Bowen cemetery.

Deceased was a native of New York state. He came to Kent County, Mich., many years ago and settled in Bowen township where he lived more than thirty years. Later he returned to New York, and some few years ago came east again, making his home in this village where he remained until his death. He had been in failing health for some time, his physicians had warned him that death might occur unexpectedly, and during the past few days he had expressed the belief that the end was near.

Returning from a neighborhood call about four o'clock he went to his room and sat down in his rocking chair where he slept quietly away within a few moments. He leaves one son, Wayland Taylor of Saranac, Michigan, and one daughter, Mrs. Ora Henry of Washington state, besides a number of grandchildren.

LUCAS J. ROBINSON

Respected Pioneer of Vergennes Buried Yesterday.

Lucas J. Robinson, notice of whose passing away last Wednesday night appeared in last week's issue, was laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery Sunday afternoon, services having been held at the home conducted by Rev. W. D. Ogg.

Lucas J. Robinson, son of Rodney and Mary Robinson, was born in Robinson township, Ottawa County, Michigan, Sept. 4, 1836. He came to Lowell with his parents in 1837 and settled on the farm just north of the village which has ever since been his home. Like his father and other relatives, he was connected with the early history and development of Lowell and Vergennes. In 1901 and 1902 he was treasurer and in 1906 Justice of the Peace of Vergennes township.

On May 16, 1860, he was married to Henrietta Walker. To them were born three daughters, Mrs. F. C. Alger of Stanley, No. Dakota, Mrs. G. W. Schneider of Albion, Mich., and Mrs. C. G. Perry of Lowell. All were with him in his last illness and did all that willing hands and kind hearts could do.

Besides his immediate family he leaves to mourn his loss, two sisters, Mrs. Clarinda Stocking of Lakeview, Mich., and Mrs. Delilah White of Grand Rapids. Those from out of town attending the funeral were: Mrs. Hiram Robinson and daughters Miss Mary and Mrs. Ida Phillips, R. A. White of Grand Rapids, L. White of Wasco, Ill., Mrs. Geo. Mr. Robinson was a long and patient sufferer and when the Master's summons came was ready and willing to go. He always appreciated every little act in his behalf and in his last hours said he wished to "thank everyone" for their kindness to him. He was a devoted husband and father, a kind friend to all and we believe the world is better for his having lived in it.

It is so seldom that a man, without ostentation and demagoguery, expresses in his official life the spirit of the day that when one is found it seems a misfortune that his services ever should be lost to the people."
