[National Crop Improvement Service.] Sowing the Seed.—The seed should be sown with a disc or shoe drill, rather than with a broadcast seeder. If rather than with a broadcast seeder. If sown 2 to 2½ inches in depth, there will be less danger of winter-killing. For a grain crop, 1½ bushels per acre is regarded as sufficient seed; although if the variety used is a large-kerneled one, 1½ bushels is advisable. Where the crop is desired for fall pacture, 1½ to 2 bushels per acre should be shown.


