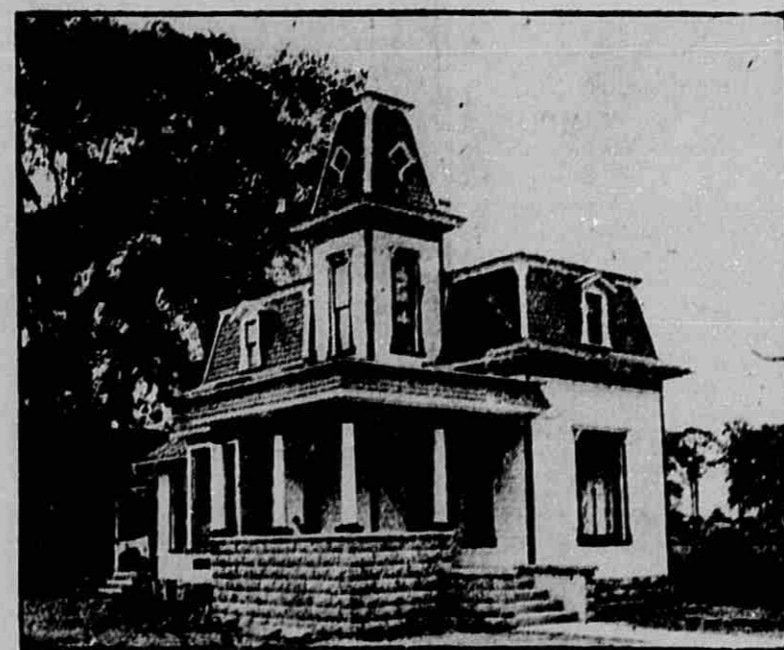

OLD PARTIES OPEN CAMPAIGN

Musselman and Mapes Came Saturday Evening.

Congressman Sweet Spoke to Lowell Voters Yesterday. M. McPherson's Maiden Speech in Grand Rapids.

The presidential campaign of 1912 has been formally opened in Lowell and Kent county generally, and figuratively speaking things may be expected to get warmer and hotter until the election November 5.

Messrs. Musselman and Mapes, candidates for governor and congressman on the Republican ticket, assisted by Andy Effe, opened the ball Saturday evening, speaking from an automobile to a good street crowd. They had close attention and made good addresses, from a Republican standpoint, though neither mentioned President Taft. Mr. Musselman claimed credit to the G. O. P. for present and past progressive administration of state affairs if elected governor.

Mr. Mapes claimed to be a progressive and pointed to his record for progressive measures in the legislature to prove it, pledging himself to the same line of action if elected to congress. His Democratic hearers smiled when the speaker described the "Pill-tickle-you-and-you-tickle-me" features of tariff legislation.

The Democratic schedule for yesterday, starting in Lowell, was disarranged throughout by a misunderstanding of the hour for arrival of the Grand Trunk train bearing Mr. Ferris, candidate for governor, and the train was an hour late at that, arriving about noon.

In the meantime, A. A. Ellis gave a talk on county matters, advising a "house cleaning."

Congressman Sweet gave a fair resume of national affairs from the standpoint of a progressive Democrat and gave a modest review of his own services during the past two years. He also told of remedial tariff legislation put through House and Senate by Democrats and Progressive Republicans, that had been vetoed by the President and was warmly applauded.

The crowd broke up at noon, the speakers going to the hotel; and they left for Alto after dinner, giving Mr. Ferris no opportunity to speak. He will probably be heard here at an evening meeting during the campaign.

In Grand Rapids yesterday a Progressive county conference was held, at which Melvin McPherson of Vergennes, candidate for the legislature from the Second district, made another hit. This is what the Herald says of it:

Melvin McPherson made his maiden political speech and with the Moose he made a big hit. He took a rap at almost everything in the Republican party from President Taft down to one of the chauffeurs of one of the automobiles that took the Republican candidates about the country last week and also handed out a delfy to the candidates on the Republican ticket for county offices that unless they "come across" with contributions to the Bull Moose campaign the same as they did to the Republican fund, they need not look for any support from the Roosevelt.

"Unless they show us that they are with us just as much as they are with the Republican party in county politics, I am going to vote a county ticket, even if I have to write every name in on the ballot," he said. He said the Republican county nominees were with the Bull Moose men to their faces, and said things that did not sound good when their backs were turned.

"I for one, want to find out just where these fellows stand," he said. "Pass the campaign sheet to them and see if they are with us. Before I came out as a Bull Moose, they came to me and wanted me to run for the legislature as a Republican. I would not have a cent of campaign expense, they told me. Now that I am a Bull Moose, they have changed their minds. To my face the Republican county candidates tell me they are with me. I want to find out just where they stand."

Then he proceeded to tell Senator Van Alden Smith, the Grand Rapids Herald, the county good roads commissioners, and everybody else that is not Bull Moose.

Dr. C. H. Anderson, R. Van Dyke and F. B. Rhodes attended the big Ferris-Marshall meeting in Grand Rapids last night and the last two remained for the state convention today. On his return this morning the Doctor reported a great meeting and tremendous enthusiasm. Ferris and Marshall had the crowd both in body and in spirit and hundreds were unable to get into the immense building. This morning's Herald likens "Little Tom" Marshall to "Long Tom" Jefferson and confirms the report. So it must be true, "and then some."
