

MANAGEMENT OF SANDY SOILS WEED CONTROL IN AUTUMN fessor of Soils Michigan Agricul-

After the crop is removed, from new After sandy land, such as is found seedings and stubble lands, the weeds After sandy land, such as is round in western and northern Michigan, has been brought under cultivation, great care must still be exercised in its management. The cropping value of these soils will depend more than anything else upon the incorporation and retention of organic matter. To this end: a careful rotation of crops should be adopted. It should be simple and short, something like this:

(1) Clover, one or two years, plowing under as much of the aftergrowth is possible when preparing for the succeeding crop; (2) a cultivated crop—potatoes, corn or possibly beans, and (3) grain of some kind, seeding again to clover with grain.
