**A NARROW ESCAPE**

For Pere Marquette Passenger Train at Lowell.

What might have been a disastrous wreck to a Pere Marquette passenger train, was narrowly averted here Saturday afternoon, when two coaches of the Saginaw-Grand Rapids train, due in the latter city at 4:50 p. m., left the rails on the trestle just south of the village and north of Grand river bridge. The rails were spread and twisted, the track and ties torn up and broken and the trestle badly damaged. Fortunately, the train stopped just short of going over the ten-foot embankment and the passengers escaped with only a scare and a severe shaking up from the bumping of the car wheels on the ties.

The train left the Lowell depot at 3:50 and had just rounded the curve after passing over Flat river when, it is supposed, the brake beam fell, causing the cars to leave the rails. Some sixty ties and ten rails were smashed and bent.

A wrecking train was called from Grand Rapids and a work train with ties and rails from Edmore. Two coaches were brought from Grand Rapids and the passengers reached that city at 10:45 with their own engine, which was unharmed, in charge of Conductor McNeihoff and Engineer Robinson.

The track was ready for traffic again at 1:30 Sunday morning.

**Old Lowell Resident Dies at Allegan, Aged 72**

Fredrick Johnson, a resident of Lowell during the past seven years, died Saturday, Nov. 9th, at the home of his daughter at Miner Lake, Allegan county, aged 72 years. Funeral services were held at Saranac Tuesday afternoon conducted by Rev. F. W. Magdanz, his former Lowell pastor, and burial took place in Saranac cemetery.

Fredrick Johnson was born in Hanover, Germany, Jan. 21, 1840. He left Germany in 1866 and went to London. After working there one year he came to America, settling soon afterward on a farm near Saranac, Michigan, where he spent many years. He was married to Miss Ada Benzelhausen April 8, 1874. Three children were born to them, two of whom are living. Mrs. J. J. Link of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Mrs. Fred Liecht of Allegan, the son Fred having died two years ago. He had lived in this village during the past seventeen years. In June of this year, his health being very poor, Mrs. Liecht took him to her home where she cared for him until his death.

**GRATTAN ARRESTS ADA NEWS BUDGET**

**Lessetter and Geller Charged with Liquor Selling.**

From Grand Rapids Herald, Nov. 2.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Louis T. Herman authorized warrants to be issued last night charging two Grattan Center men with running blind pigs.

One is a druggist, Everett Lessetter, and the other, Anthony Geller, an ex-saloon keeper.

More than a dozen signed statements were made under oath yesterday afternoon in the prosecutor's office by persons who allege they purchased liquor from both of the accused.

Lessetter heard of the statements early in the afternoon, and later appeared at Mr. Herman's to "see if he couldn't square it." The assistant prosecutor led him out to talk of the selling, but refused in any way to grant him clemency. When he told him he would be arrested just as soon as an officer could be summoned, Lessetter appeared to take it as a joke.

When the druggist learned that he was ensnared, he denied the charge. He was taken to Grattan Center by Deputy Sheriff Donovan, where he supplied bonds for his appearance in the justice court here Monday morning.

Lessetter, it is alleged, has not taken out a druggist's license for the sale of liquor. It is also charged that he has been disposing of it without asking the purchaser written assurance that it was for medicinal purposes.

The charge against Geller is specifically for selling liquor without a license.

It is alleged that the illegal sale of liquor has been in progress at Grattan Center for several weeks but it was only a few days ago that the prosecutor's office was notified of it.

Frank Ryder, aged 56 years, died suddenly this (Thursday) morning at three o'clock at his home in Vergennes, having been taken ill with heart failure. Funeral arrangements are as yet indefinite, though it is expected the services will be held Sunday.
