Propose Swiss Election System.
 Rep. Kappler, of Houghton county, has introduced two proposals in the lower house of the legislature which are revolutionary in their character. Both are concurrent resolutions. The first and of important consequence is designed to establish an initiative system of legislative representation in Michigan and is based on the representative system in vogue in Switzerland where the initiative and referendum came from. It will provide that the members of the house and senate be elected in accordance with the percentage of the vote. The resolution of the second proposal is a concurrent constitutional amendment to the people and it will be distributed by a bill which will be introduced by the same member of the house.

Gov. Leonard Verdie of Grand Rapids, who introduced the bill placing all state employees under civil service, has the hearty cooperation and support of every man and woman now on the state payroll. Whether it is a commendable bit of legislation or not is a question on which the legislature is divided. The father of the bill believes that it has a vast array of voluntary supporters. He expects to win and sees his plan as the first fair solution of the problem.

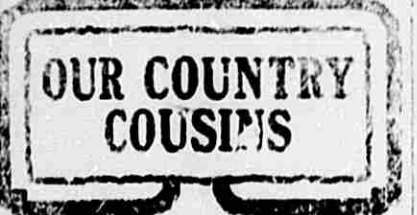
