AN OLD RESIDENT

Mrs. John C. Scott Lived Many Years Here

Mrs. Olive L. Scott died February 3 at the home of her nephew, Harry Davis at Ivanrest, at the age of 80 years.

Her maiden name was Olive Littlefield. She was born in Ohio, June 12, 1833. In 1838 she came to Michigan with her mother, Mrs. Candace Littlefield, one of the early pioneers of Michigan and a member of the Dexter family of Ionia. She was married at the age of 18 to John C. Scott and lived for several years in Grand Rapids where she was an active and earnest member of the Fountain Street Baptist church. For a number of years she was a member of the church choir. In 1866 she accompanied her husband to Lowell, Mich., which was their home for nearly 24 years.

In 1890 Mr. and Mrs. Scott returned to Grand Rapids where they lived at their home on Sunset avenue until Mr. Scott's death three years ago.

Always frail in health, but courageous in spirit, Mrs. Scott ended an honored and useful life as she had lived it, a faithful friend, devoted to her family, her church, her home. A woman of quiet, but lasting influence who will not soon be forgotten.

The funeral services were held from the family residence, 226 Sunset avenue. Services were conducted by Rev. J. T. Husted, pastor of the Wallin Congregational church.

NEWS FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

REP. WILCOX HOPES TO OBTAIN A \$200,000 PRISON IN ONTARIO COUNTY.

Under the Jerome Bill, Wayne County's representation is increased from 14 to 19, Kent Gains One, Making—Alligan Lose One.

Representative Wilcox, of Ontonagon county, hopes through the aid of a concurrent resolution to secure the appointment of a commission to investigate the feasibility of erecting a new \$200,000 prison in Ontonagon county.

It is Rep. Wilcox's idea that it would be a good proposition to transfer some of the inmates at the Lapeer house for the feeble minded and epileptic to Marquette prison, and erect a new prison in Ontonagon county where the convicts would work.

According to the Ontonagon representative, who is himself a miner, the copper mines in Ontonagon county have never been fully developed, but he believes the state could succeed where private parties have failed.

Rep. Wilcox says that the inmates of the Lapeer house would find the climate much better at Marquette, and that it would relieve the crowded conditions of the home.

This year's budget is destined to be the largest in many sessions if all the appropriations bills now pending in the legislature receive favorable consideration, as Rep. Hinkley, chairman of the ways and means committee, has said that the total asked for this year is \$9,232,000, and in view of the probability that the total this year will include many items not mentioned in 1912.

The total amount recommended at the end of last session was \$9,881,000. And it is estimated that by former Governor Olson until the total was \$9,107,533.90. In view of what these figures indicate, the million dollar surplus left by Olson in the administration promises not to go very far in taking care of the expenses incident to the present administration.

Although slightly amended the bill for reapportionment of congressional districts. The basis for apportionment is one representative for each 28,100 population. Inasmuch as the old basis was \$9,107,533.90, it is estimated that \$24,000 is a county must have increased in population to remain equal to its old representation.

INCOME TAX ASSURED

UNEXPECTED ACTION BY STATE LEGISLATURE COMPLETES NECESSARY RATIFICATION OF CONSTITUTION.

Four states of 40 which passed an act on Oct. 27 turned it down. Will Produce Revenue of \$100,000,000.—Likely That Act Will Affect Income of More Than \$5,000, Possibly \$4,000.

An income tax is now one of the provisions of the constitution of the state. It was approved by the voters in 1908.

It has been learned that the organization of railway trustees is back of the bill introduced by Senator Ogg to amend the workmen's compensation act.

Under the terms of the resolution as it passed the senate, Colonel Roosevelt, Mr. Taft and Woodrow Wilson have been named as the candidates for the presidency in future contests.

The resolution now is pending in the house and it is expected that it will be passed there in a few days.

Rep. Martz, of Detroit, is a believer in large families and he does not believe that any restrictions should be placed on persons who are bent on increasing the population by having their families.

Secretary Merrill T. Murray of the state board of corrections and charities, favors a repeal of the present law which prohibits the use of opiates in state institutions.

The Michigan Association of Commercial Executives held their first meeting in Grand Rapids last week. President M. C. Huggert, of Grand Rapids advised against the association.

ADRIANOPLE SHELLED

Fire Bombardment of the Forts Around Adrianople was Began Monday.

A terrific bombardment of the forts around Adrianople was begun Monday by the Bulgarians and Serbians surrounding the city, to the number of over 100,000. Almost at the conclusion of the bombardment the Bulgarians and Serbians were seen from various points commanding the fort.
