So, while the doctors disagree, private citizens who are disfranchised because other citizens failed to vote, will continue to agree that if the old constitution stands for robbery and injustice, it's time to fix the constitution.

While millions of people are extending the hand of sympathy and aid to the stricken ones, fiends in human form are robbing the dead and looting wrecked and demolished homes. Let us be thankful that the vicious element is proportionately so small.
