## A REPUBLICAN DAY

### In Michigan and Kent County Monday, Suffrage Defeated.

Monday was Republican day in Michigan and in Kent county, that party's candidates for supreme justices, university regents, etc., being elected by pluralities ranging from 30,000 to 50,000. The Republican county road commissioners, Brown, Look and Bloomer, were re-elected, running far in advance of the fusion nominees.

Woman suffrage was defeated in the state by 40,000 and in the county by a large majority. Grand Rapids leading with a vote of 9672 noes to 4225 yes.

Lowell voted 213 no to 182 yes on county poor dormitory; 214 no to 202 yes on suffrage; 157 yes to 85 no on recall, and gave large yes majorities to both initiative and referendum propositions.

Ionia county remains dry by safe majority, and Genesee county, with the city of Flint, returns from wet to dry.

The proposition to bond for the county home dormitory was defeated.

State returns indicate the endorsement of the proposed constitutional amendments for the initiative, referendum and recall.

Lowell elected the following officers: Supervisor, C. Bergin; clerk, F. N. White; treasurer, Harold Hiler; highway commr., Chas. O'Harrow; justice, Clarence Yeiter; overseer, A. O. Hood; board review, L. J. Post; constables, Geo. Taylor; Herman Ralmer, Chas. Cuddebeck, W. Yeiter.

For county road commissioners, Lowell gave Brown 277, Look 321 and Loomis 288 votes. Grattan elected Ed. L. Brooks supervisor over Lee Jakeway 147 to 90.

Cannon elected Ramsdell supervisor.

In Ada the Progressives put a ticket in the field and drew on the Republican vote, permitting the Democrats to land in several offices. The results: Supervisor, James H. Ward; clerk, James Harris; treasurer, John Verlin; highway commissioner, Moses Waverly; justice, John Abrams; board review, Grant Fraser, Republican, and Joe Butterick, tie vote.

Vergennes elected the entire Republican ticket: Supervisor A. S. Bennett, clerk, A. C. Biggs, treasurer, A. Condon; justice, H. B. Tuttle; highway commissioner, G. Kropf, overseer, Fred Condon; board review, M. L. Bailey; constables, F. Biggs, John Miller, Asa Vanderbrock; Frank Jones.

## ALFALFA GROWERS ARE ORGANIZED

### County Organization Has Plans For Active Campaign.

Declared Crop Can Be Grown Anywhere in County Where Drainage is Good.—Managers Named.

The Kent County Alfalfa Growers' association was organized last week at the Association of Commerce rooms, with Farm Demonstrator J. H. Skinner as general manager of the association and the campaign it is about to undertake in the county to induce farmers to grow this crop.

Resolutions adopted explain the purpose of the organization, setting forth that it has been definitely proved that alfalfa can be grown anywhere in Kent county where drainage is good, and that every farmer can with profit raise anywhere from 10 to 40 acres of it. It is explained that alfalfa not only produces a greater yield per acre of the best possible forage for all kinds of livestock, but also greatly enriches the soil by improving its mechanical condition and adding nitrogen taken from the air. It is declared it is equal to wheat bran pound for pound as stock feed; that one acre of alfalfa is equal to six of timothy, and that when corn will net \$15.83 per acre, alfalfa will net \$50 per acre.

P. G. Holden of the agricultural extension was invited by the association to aid in conducting the campaign in Kent county. The alfalfa campaign committee is composed of the following: William Malloy, chairman; Milo Edison, Joseph H. Brewer, C. H. Hunsburger, James Patterson, H. D. Perkins, Charles Holding and Mr. Skinner. Lee H. Bierce was chosen chairman of the auto train committee, J. H. Brewer of the financial committee, County School Commissioner A. N. Freeland of a committee to introduce the subject into the rural schools. S. J. McDonald heads the publicity committee, and has selected as members L. G. Stuart, Leve Purcell and George Welsh.

It is expected that the campaign will open about April 15, and be continued for 10 days or two weeks, to be conducted with automobiles throughout the county.

### ALFALFA GROWING IN MUSKOGEE COUNTY

A conservative estimate of the alfalfa acreage of western Michigan shows the total figure at 6,000 acres. This is an average of 200 acres for each one of the twenty counties. THAT the moral responsibility for the death of Benjamin Taylor must fall upon those who voted to keep Kent county under the licensed saloon system, was the opinion expressed by Rev. L. E. Lemox at the Methodist church Sunday evening. The statement was calmly and dispassionately made, but with earnestness and evident firm conviction. THE LEADER is compelled to state its belief that the pastor is right. Aside from the fact that the local option election was evidently unfair, many illegal votes in all probability having been cast, Lowell has the saloons because a majority of citizens voted to accept a price for permitting them to continue business. The rowdism, insults to women and girls, drunkenness, fights, disgrace and deaths that have resulted, are the legitimate outcome of the liquor traffic and those who voted for it must bear the responsibility.

EQUAL suffrage in Michigan has again been postponed. The question is not settled, and will not be until it is settled right; and that will be done some day on the basis of justice. In the meantime, let women remain womanly and let men remain manly. Let us have no unwomanly exhibitions at home and abroad; for every sanction or assent to unseemly actions means less of good support. Suffragists must recognize the fact that the organized liquor traffic is their direct foe, as it is also the enemy of the home, and make common cause against a common foe. Lastly, it would certainly do no harm to appreciate their best friends.

THE attempt to force higher telephone rates on Mayville people didn't work just as planned. 
