

BOY DROWNED IN

GLENN HAWLEY'S FATAL PLUNGE.

Body Recovered after an Hour. Lowell Boy 16 Years Old Burial Monday.

Grand river claimed another victim Saturday in the person of ilenn Hawley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Hawley of this village, who was drowned near Hoffman's landing about 2 o'clock hat afternoon.

Glenn, in company with Clinon and Manly Johnson had been swimming for some time, and the former was resting on a submerged snag on the south side of the river, when he fell and went to the bottom in deep water. Clinton Johnson says he made repeated efforts to save Glenn but found it impossible to get the body above water.

Manly Johnson had gone to the Cameron house on the hill to telephone for aid from town. Harley Maynard, Deputy Sheriff Raimer, G. E. Martin, J. E. Lewis, Hi. Hawley, the lad's father, Undertaker Yeiter and others responded; but the body when removed had been in the water more than an hour and efforts to

revive life were in vain. Glenn was an epileptic sufferer and it is believed had an attack when he fell. Coroner Andrews considered an inquest unnecessary. Glenn was 16 years, 3 months and 14 days old.

CASE OF INHUMANITY

Local Shipped Cattle Suffer from

Every power at the command of the state should be bent to he utmost in an effort to place the responsibility for the carelessness that resulted in several hundreds of hogs and cows being confined in railroad cars from 5 o'clock Tuesday until Friday night of last week. There is a law in this state which provides that animals shall not be confined in a car for more than sixteen hours at a time, and which forbids the herding together of different species. The latter provision is to prevent the crushing and crowding of the weaker by the stronger if, as was done in this case, cattle are confined with

The horrors of vivisection, which arouse the indignation of so many, are less than the cruelty of permitting closely imprisoned nimals to die in agony from ack of a little attention. Viviection has a definite object. It is supposed that the suffering of the animals in the end will decrease the suffering of human beings. They are living sacrifices

on the altar of science. The shocking neglect disclosed when one cow and fifteen hogs were found dead among those arriving at Plymouth last week had no such object. It was simply a ase of reckless inattention to dictates of common humanity. The progress of the car should be comparatively easy to trace. \$1,000,000 FOR GOOD ROADS

Have Million for Building and Im-

provement of Highways.

As a result of an energetic good roads campaign waged by Spokane citizens the last two years, Spokane county will have \$919,000 for road building and improvement in 1913 and 1914. With an additional \$163,000 appropriated by the legislature for state roads immediately tributary to Spokane, the total is brought to \$1,-082,405. The distribution calls for 90 per cent. of the amount being concentrated on continuous stretches of standard highway built from trade centers along main traveled roads which are a part of the state primary trunk highway system. In the comprehensive road program a law has been enacted providing for the development of roads in counties whose assessed valuations do not permit of extensive road work. Thus a portion of Spokane's road money will be used in building highways in other countles, thus connecting all parts of the state. Seattle and Tacoma are to take care of the western Washington and mountain counties in the same way. All state road expenditures are made by the state, under direct supervision of the state highway commissioner.





Which All Broadtail Varieties Descend-Is Hardy.

The Arabi or Karakul sheep has its origin in the Khanate of Bokhara, central Asia, and belongs to the longwool family from which all broadtail daughter Mona will leave Thursday bi bucks have been smuggled into Afghanistan, Persia, Turkestan, China, Palestine, Syria, Asia Minor and Egypt and because of the ignorance of the native who seem to have no conception of proper breeding have been crossed with native sheep of the longwool, short-wool and hairy classes, to the most inferior type of domestic sheep imaginable. ries, their sheep industry today would amount to absolutely nothing. As the Arabi is essentially a desert animal, and able to withstand any amount of hardship, evidently not minding the intense heat in the summer nor the severe cold in the winter, often going jays without food and water, it can readily be seen why the people living In the arid countries of central Asia found it advantageous to cross their native sheep with the Arabi, which is the heaviest sheep known. The barren, semi-mountainous country of Bokhara in which the Arabi thrives certainly except here and there in the small valleys, and nature has made it possible for this animal to store in a short time large quanities of fat in its immense tail, weighing from 25 to 50 pounds, upon which it draws for sustenance when necessity demands it, and these properties are in a large measure transmitted to the offspring resulting from crossing the Arabi with the native sheep. One has to eat the mutton of the Arabi but once to realize that is has absolutely no "sheepy" taste, but possesses a delicious and very appe-Izing flavor.

blue streak over its bumps and chuckholes and wonders why somebody does not know enough to fix it so it will stay fixed. The legislator lounges in the leather chairs in the state capitol and delivers profound discourses on it and its uses and abuses, and the best way to fix it and keep it fixed. The board of supervisors meet and look wise and talk their heads off about the way it should be taken care of, and how the care-taking expenses should be met. And still the county road slumbers on and never gets much above the mud except in dry summers or very cold winters, when the traffic can skat along on the ice, says the Northwestern Stockman and farmer. The country road is an orphan and usually a friendless orphan. Like the Arkansas house, it can't be fixed while it is raining, and when it doesn't rain there is no need for fixing it. It is a public domain where poll taxes may be worked at leisure, and with the least possible efforts by the party that is segregating himself from so much of his valuable time for the good of the commonwealth. Its surface is marred here by a hole dug by an unruly plow, there by seven scraperfuls of dirt dumped in the middle of it just prior to quitting time. There are useless trees bordering it that shut out the sunlight and keep off the wind so that its surface shall remain the consistency of putty the longest possible time. It is a bone of contention for neighborhood rows over who shall be "road-boss" and how the poll taxes shall be "worked." I am not trying to solve the country road

problem, but I am endeavoring to call The country road problem is too deep and complicated for one man to solve. It will require the best and most conservative brains in the state to settle upon some plan that will make the country road what it was intended for-a highway for traffic with the least possible resistence. METHODS OF TREE PLANTING Many People Make Serious Mistakes


of Simply Sticking Roots in Bun-

dle in Deep Hole. (By W. R. GILBERT.)
To my mind there is not half enough attention paid to the way trees are put into the hole when planting. Some people think that because trees have roots they should grow nearly on top

of every ditch in the country. For ten years I planted trees yearly. Half the trees I planted the first year failed because I didn't know how to plant properly. I said to myself there was something wrong somewhere, either in the trees or in my want of

knowing how to plant. I experimented a couple of years and found out the 'secret of my fallure.' Half of the young trees are nearly useless for planting on account of the ways they are pulled at the

Some men, when they go pulling trees in the nurserles pull away just as though they were pulling turnips in a hurry, slapping the roots together and throwing them away as if they were no more than rotten limbs. Young trees, to my mind, should be

not pulled.

pulling they grow the first year badly and then die away. I examined the roots of a dozen young trees; there were two strained and I cut the roots short in two more, for experiment's

The ones that were not strained grew healthy from the start and are growing well. The ones that were strained grew nearly right the first year and died the second year, and the ones that I cut a little of the roots off lived in "decline."

The roots, when planting, should be spread out evenly in a broad hole, not deep, the roots just barely covered. Where some, or most people, perhaps, make the mistake is in sticking the roots in a bundle in a deep hole. Trees planted in this fashion are

bound to fail. At least it has been my Some people give the trees a pull up after planting. With this method I don't agree. There is no need of

any more handling. It is important to press the roots, secondly, say after a month, because of the air gets down alongside the stem the tree is liable to fail.

I have found always that the fall was the best time for planting. When they were put in late I had more fail-

Another thing I notice in planting is, if the young trees are any length of time pulled they are pretty sure to
