H. N. LEE'S BAD FIRE

Keene Farmer Met Heavy Loss Sunday Night.

About seven o'clock Sunday night the large and complete hay and grain barn on the farm of H. N. Lee, one mile east and half a mile south of Keene grange hall, was burned to the ground, together with a silo, several smaller buildings and some lumber. The barn contained the fall crop of beans and about sixty tons of hay, which were also consumed, together with corn crib, granary and contents.

The barn across the road also caught fire, and for a time it looked as if that and the house would both be destroyed. Hard work saved these buildings; but in the excitement, Mr. Lee's son Dell slipped from the wet roof of the second barn and fell to the ground, suffering a bad fracture in one ankle.

The light on the high grounds of the Lee place was seen from Lowell and Saranac, and drew spectators and helpers from far and near, automobiles making quick work of the distance for many. Saranac dealers sent out a supply of pails for the fire-fighters. Much material was removed from the burning buildings.

Mr. Lee's loss on the six buildings and contents amounts to several thousands of dollars, partially covered with insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown. At first attributed to spontaneous combustion; later opinions connected the disaster with some unknown tramp.

TIPPLERS BEWARE

Wife Can Haul You Before Probate Court.

LANSING, Mich., Sept. 5.—Tipplers must beware of their wives from now on, for under a law passed by the last legislature a wife can petition the court to appoint a guardian for her husband.

If a wife, or any blood relation, shall deem a person a habitual drunkard or so addicted to the use of drugs as to be in need of medical or sanitary treatment, all they need to do is to take the case before probate court.

If the court deems a guardian necessary the tippler or drug user may either be sent to a state hospital or allowed liberty under the watchful eye of his guardian. The guardian is supposed to shadow his charge more or less and report to the court at least once a year and as often as required by the court.

It is expected that the practice of appointing guardians will supplant that of sending drunkards to the house of correction.

DETROIT-GRAND RAPIDS LINE

ENGLAND AND BOSTON CAPITAL INTERESTED.

Plan Electrical System with Sleeping Car Service Between Terminals. Construction Begins in Spring.

An electric railroad, crossing Michigan from Detroit to Grand Rapids, is a promise of the near future, with work probably to begin next spring. H. M. Wallace of Detroit is the promoter of the project, which is most elaborate in its details, and he claims to have already secured the capital from England and Boston and to have the necessary franchises and rights of way from the limits of the two terminal cities.

It is the plan of Mr. Wallace to make use of the electric cars such as are used on the Union Pacific, and now in use on the Ann Arbor road, and which make as high as 70 miles an hour. The road will in a considerable degree parallel the Pere Marquette, Lansing being the stop in the middle of the system. It will not, it is said, make use of any existing lines, but be a new structure throughout. Mr. Wallace claims to have all the rights of way and all the necessary franchises outside Detroit and Grand Rapids, but expects to have no difficulty in getting into these cities once he has reached their doors.

If his plan goes through, and it is said he now is in a position where there is practically no question of the future, passenger traffic will be revolutionized between this city and the metropolis of Michigan. It is planned to have electric trains leave each of the terminal cities each half hour, and for short distances outside the city a more frequent schedule will be maintained.

Another feature of the service which will prove most interesting is a sleeping car service which it is intended to run on a slow schedule, giving patrons a chance to retire along in the evening and wake up about six o'clock the next morning in the city of their destination.

All features of a steam road are to be made use of in the electric line, plus a more frequent service and a faster one for the limited trains.

It is claimed for the proposition that the money is at hand for the beginning of construction, and that when the ground will permit next spring actual construction will begin.

Little of this project has apparently been heard in Grand Rapids, but in Detroit the matter has become, among business men and others interested in such a road, an open secret. [Grand Rapids Herald, Sept. 9.]

PAID STRONG'S FINE

Substantial Sympathy Shown Lowell Business Man.

Sympathy with an enterprising fellow business man and the belief that he had been excessively fined under a law that should not apply to small rural communities, led Lowell dealers to raise a purse to pay the fine and costs assessed against Herman Strong by a Grand Rapids justice for alleged violation of the 54-hour labor law, as applied to women and girls.

During the busy Home Coming time, handicapped by the illness of his wife, and himself working over twenty hours a day, it is claimed working hours exceeded the prescribed limit.

A woman inspector came and quizzed the help to work up a case, which was started in Lowell, but later withdrawn and transferred to a Grand Rapids justice court, which administered a fine of \$50 and costs.

In May, 1861, she married Isaac Tomlinson. Of five children born to this union two survive, Fred Tomlinson and Mrs. Annie Underhill, both of Lowell. She lived at Alton for several years after her husband's death, and on September 4, 1882, she married Marvin Sherman of that place. One daughter, Mrs. Bert Hayes, is the survivor of this union.

Three brothers, Gibson Jones of Lowell, Rev. Ira B. Jones of Toledo, and Wesley Jones of McBrides, two sisters, Mary Cope of Caro and Lois Evans of Stanton, and many grandchildren, relatives and friends are left to mourn her loss.

Mrs. Sherman became a Christian in early life and remained faithful to the end.—[Com.]

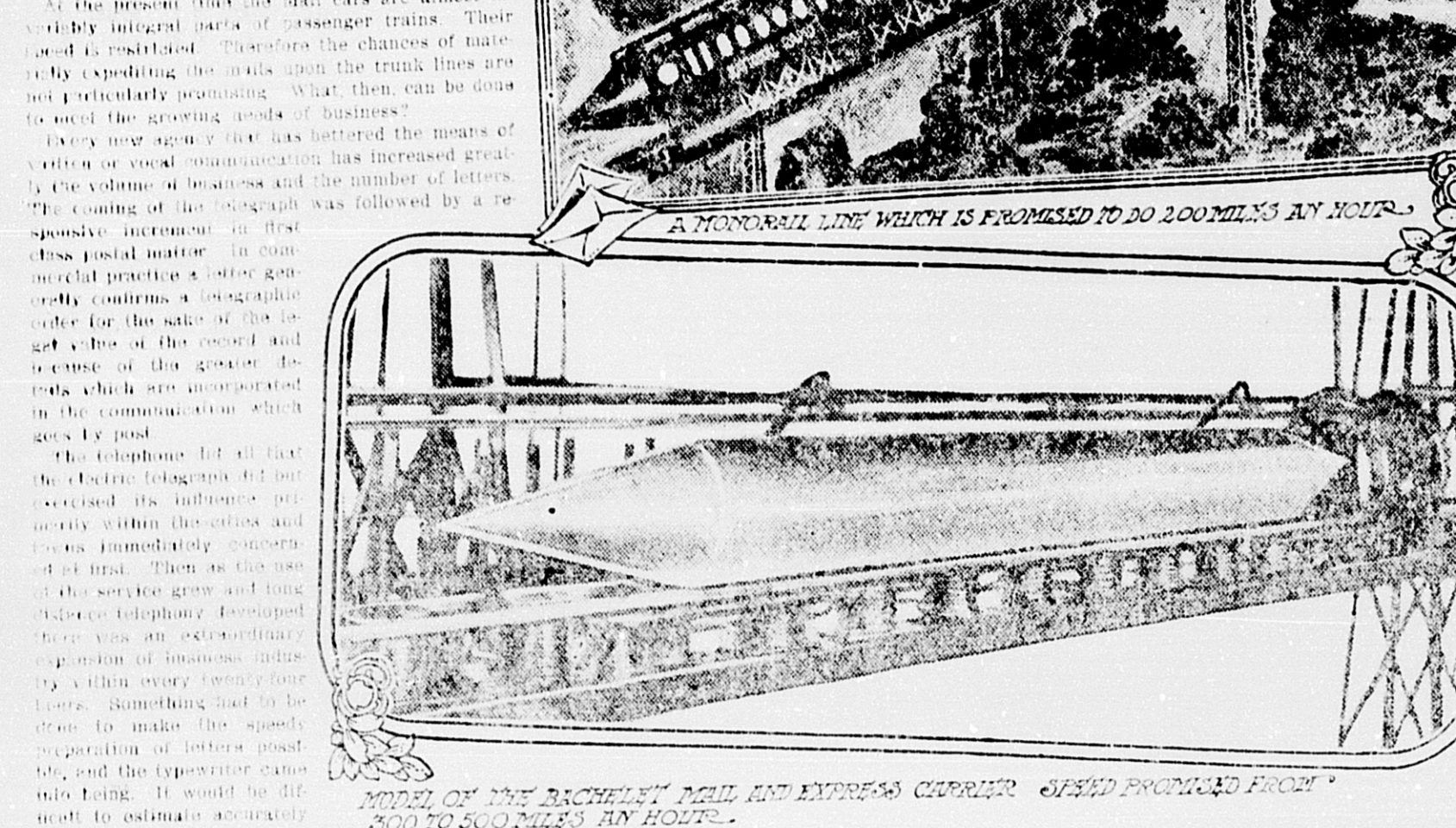
