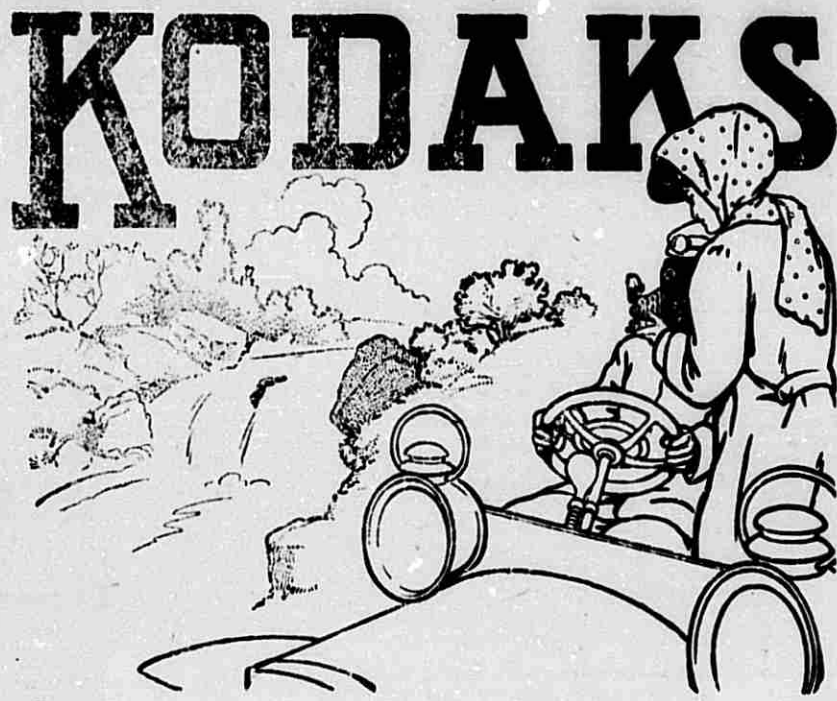

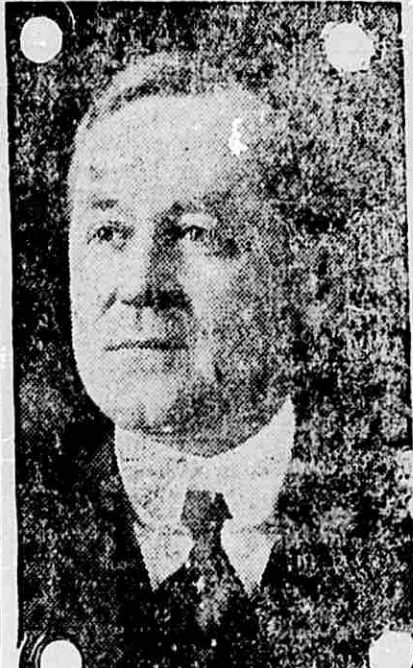

Geo. M. Winegar sang "The Jolly Bachelor," and responded cheerfully to encore.

R. Glen Dunn presented the matter of "The Chautauqua" in a convincing manner, and the Board of Trade by a rising vote endorsed the action of citizens last fall in contracting for a summer Chautauqua in Lowell next July or August. The president and secretary were instructed to sign the contract for the Board of Trade.

The address of the evening was that of Dr. A. W. Wishart of Grand Rapids on "The Business Man and Community Life." We have had able and entertaining speakers; but none have excelled Dr. Wishart. He convinced his hearers that the dollar is not all; that the business man has moral obligations to the community in general and to the young in particular, for whom wholesome and proper sports, amusements and entertainment—athletics included—must be provided. He praised the Chautauqua movement and deplored the "boxing matches." One was in accord with the "Lowell spirit," of which Mr. Frazee had spoken and the other was not. The important considerations for the business man were comprised under the following headings: Capital, Credit and Co-operation; and he quoted a familiar saying among business men everywhere on the Credit item as saying "As between a man of character without money and a man without character with money, they preferred the first." He praised the brotherhood sentiment as exemplified in gatherings of business men on banquet occasions like this as militating against the narrow sectarianisms and partizanship natural to men in their daily walks and avocations.

In a brilliant peroration, Dr. Wishart asked his hearers to remember two great men in history, Napoleon the self-seeker and the Man of Galilee, who lived and died for his fellow men. We admire the one; we love the other. If a man catches the spirit of the Nazarene he has all that religion can do for him. The singing of America closed a most pleasant and profitable evening.

**A SON OF THE HILLS**  
Life Among the Virginia Mountains.

"A Son of the Hills," by Harriet T. Comstock, one of the "six best sellers" is a story of the simple mountain people of Virginia, told by one who is well acquainted with her subjects, and is full of the quaint dialect of the hills.  
Sandy Morley, the hero, is a strong character with an unflinching purpose. Feeling within himself, while still a child, a call to broaden his own life and better the conditions of his hill people, he triumphs over the traditions of his family, who through succeeding generations, as the result of an old misunderstanding which had grown into a feud, had descended from a proud and honored estate to the irresponsible shiftless and ignorant condition of "poor whites." The story of his parting with the old surroundings, his discouraged and spiritless father and the one beloved companion of his lonely childhood, who had patiently taught him what little he knew, and of his faithful struggle for an education and an opportunity to return and lift up the mental, moral and physical conditions of his native hills, is a touching and inspiring one. The spirit of Theodore Starr, a young minister, who, long before the time of the story, had given up his life in an effort to help the people of "Lost Mountain," pervades the whole story, his memory lending a softening influence to many of the rough, ambitionless lives. His plucky niece, "The Little Doctor," had a hard fight to win their confidence and overcome their prejudices against a "female saw-bones" and to continue in her own way the work of her revered uncle. Little Cynthia, with her quaint southern dialect, childlike heart and high ideals, is a character who wins and holds the interest and love of the reader from beginning to end. A variety is given to the role of characters by the introduction of Levi and Matilda Markham, stern but kind-hearted Yankees from Massachusetts, who play an important part in the lives of the mountain people. The book is published by Doubleday, Page & Company, Garden City, N. Y.

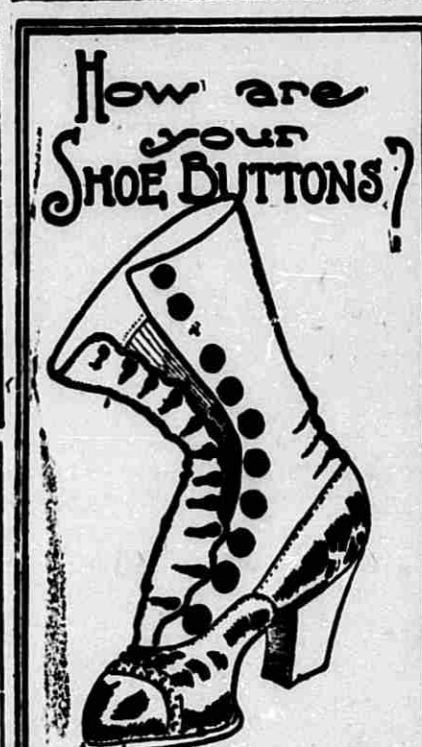
