many banks which are organized the sole purpose of meeting the needs of the farmers has awakened the Danish banker to the fact that the rural credit is a big business which he cannot afford to ignore. Compared with the American banker the Danish banker most decidedly has reformed. He does meet the needs of the farmer in a manner which would surprise Americans. This is particularly true

of the method in which he assists in financing co-operative associations. When the big Trifolium dairy association was formed, for example, it was done in this way: One hundred farmers, most of them owners of large farms, formed an organization for the manufacture of dairy products and for the further purpose of supplying milk to the city of Copenhagen. These one hundred farmers were the owners of something like 12,000 cows. While they individually had property, real and personal, they had no money fore sent their leaders to the bank to borrow the money.
