



Nampa, Ida., April 28, '14 EDITOR LOWELL LEDGER:-Please find enclose one dollar, ind payment for the biggest dollar's worth of news, straight-from-theshoulder editorials and general newspaper value we get—the Lowell Ledger.

Now that we have lived in Idaho over a year you may like our opinions of this country.

We have been much interested in the many large irrigation profects around here, and find that while it does turn a barren sage brush waste into a prosperous and beautiful country, it also brings the cost of land beyond the reach of people of ordinary means, much of the land near here being held at \$300 per acre and

As soon as possible the ranch. ers get their entire ranches into alfalfa, which brings from four dollars a ton, down to sometimes \$1.50. However, the wiser ones are getting cattle and sheep, and engaging in dairying, which is very profitable. Rents are pro portionately low, often not equaling more than one half the inter est on money invested.

Many localities are now drowned out by the seepage from the irrigation ditches so that large drainage canals are being

But if one is after a perfect climate the year round, as we were, this is the place to find it. Our little Doris has much improved health since living here, did not have a singleattack of bronchitis last winter. The spring comes very early, with practically no snow all winter, and the coldest it got here last winter was 12° above zero. In the mountainous regions it is colder, with snow. My sister was with me last winter and the two previous winters she spent in Washington and California respectively and she says the the climate here is superior to
