

VALUATIONS RAISED

But Tax Rates Lowered—Net Result the Same.


At the Council meeting Monday evening the Village Assessor reported the Village assessment as follows: real estate \$660,200; personal \$22,350; total \$948,550. This is an increase in total valuation of \$214,975 over that of last year.

The tax rates was fixed at \$1.00, divided as follows: general fund 65c, street fund 27c, sinking fund 8c. Last year's tax rate was \$1.25. So with the increased valuation and decreased rate, the actual tax remains practically the same. It is figured to raise \$285 more this year than last to cover deficiency.

The sidewalk bond of Will Bank with E. B. Smith and Charles West as sureties was approved. It was decided to insure village employees with State Insurance department; and to investigate use of road oil for dust-laying purposes.

A PIONEER GONE

Grandma Ware Laid to Rest in South Boston Cemetery

Mary S. Aldrich, daughter of Stephen and Martha Aldrich, was born in Macedon, Wayne county, New York, Oct. 13, 1828. She was married to Julius M. Ware in Berlin township, Dec. 27, 1847, residing there for a number of years and moving to Boston township in 1857, which has since been her home and where she resided with her youngest daughter until called to her Eternal Home June 8, 1914. Her husband preceded her August 24, 1874.

She was the mother of four children, Stephen A. Ware, Cynthia I. Hughson, Emma L. Story and Alice E. Kysor.

She was of a family of ten children all preceding her but one brother, S. A. Aldrich, of Lansing. She has lived trusting in her Saviour over forty years.

She is survived by three children, Stephen A. Ware, Emma L. Story and Alice E. Kysor, six grandchildren, eleven great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. She was one of the early pioneers of the country, having settled on the farm where she died when it was a wilderness, helping to transform it to what it now is.

She was a staunch friend to everyone and her friends were innumerable, as has been demonstrated by her long life in this community. All who had Grandma Ware as a friend were fortunate.

One great comfort and pleasure to her was her children and grandchildren residing near her. She has dearly loved and enjoyed the little girl who was taken into their home. Her children and grandchildren will always hold her in sweet remembrance.

It may be said of her "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the Kingdom of God."

Funeral services were held from the home Wednesday afternoon at 1:30, conducted by Rev. E. E. Chamberlin of Alto. She was laid at rest in the family lot by her five grandsons in South Boston cemetery.
