

WAREHOUSE BURNS

Old McCarty Building Destroyed Early Tuesday Morning.

The old McCarty warehouse and bean room, between the Lowell Cutter factory and the Lowell State bank building and adjoining block, was destroyed by fire early Tuesday morning, together with a quantity of baled hay, lime, cement and salt, belonging to different parties.

The Cutter factory and the city fire alarms were sounded at 5 o'clock, a time when working people were getting up; and the response by firemen, factory employees and citizens was prompt. Luckily there was no wind stirring and in spite of the dry condition of condition of things, fire was practically confined to the one building, only the adjacent "groat" building being burned in window and door-ways and having its outside stairs so badly scorched they will have to be rebuilt.

John Peterle occupied the second floor of the "groat" building; and he made a hasty and unceremonious exit. His household goods were not badly damaged.

The Cutter factory had a close call, many of its north windows being broken by the heat. The factory's own men and apparatus were "on the job;" and with the help of the fire department, saved the factory from its narrow squeak.

The back end of the business block got smoking hot and windows in the upper stories of the Howk and Yeiter & Wadsworth buildings were cracked and broken.

The fire is generally attributed to tramps, by supposition; but by reason of the fortunate escape of surrounding property is regarded as "a lucky fire."

The old warehouse was the scene of many activities in years past, when Charles McCarty used it in his wholesale produce business. Wool, beans, potatoes, peaches, apples, etc., were bought, stored or shipped from there in large quantities in the days when its general proprietor advertised "Everything on earth bought and sold."

Owner and building have now passed away; but the people of Lowell will not soon forget either.

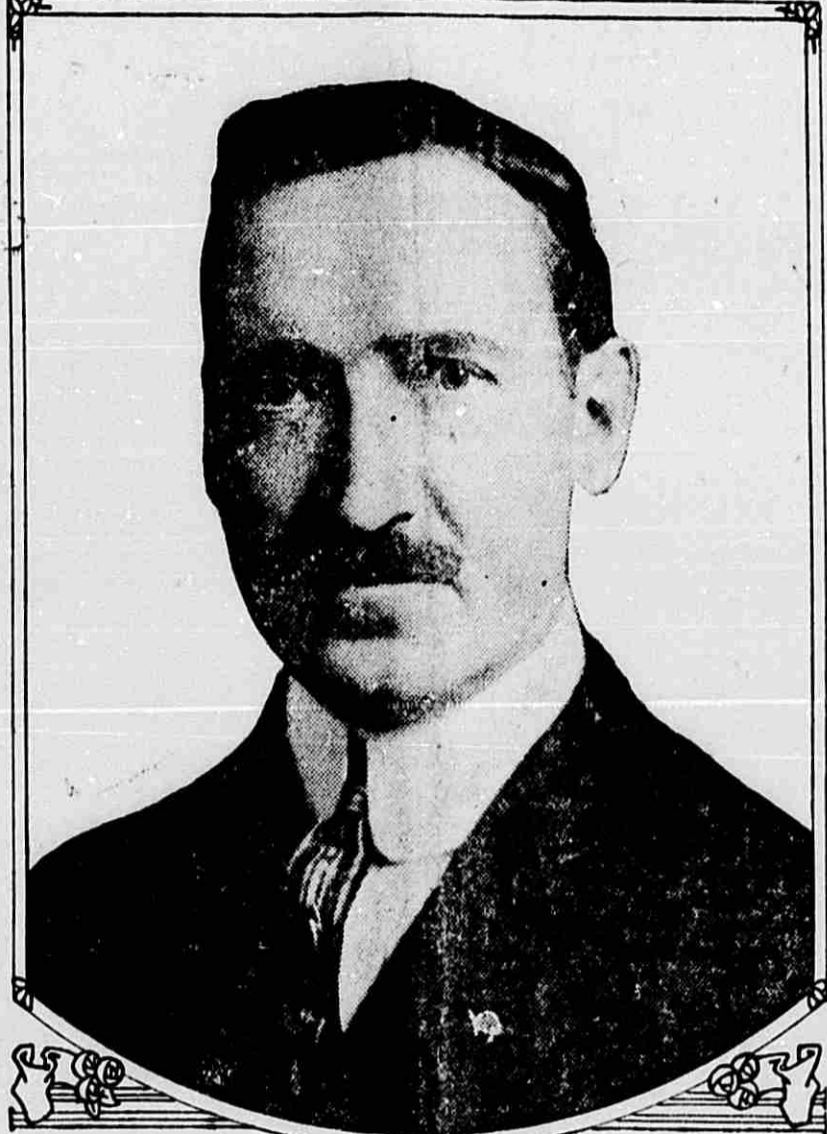

FAMOUS INDIANA JUDGE AT CHAUTAUQUA LAST DAY.

If a person from the middle walk of life were to sit in a typical court for one session he would see in a single forenoon more pathos, tragedy and sometimes more grim humor than he could tell to others in a week.

When a man has had over four years of experience on the bench of such a court and has been compelled to pass judgment upon 40,516 separate individuals accused of all kinds of crime he surely must have a story to tell of human interest at once fascinating and important. It is safe to say that the ordinary police court faces a responsibility of human destiny upon the shoulders of the judge which is not often borne by other men. By his decisions men's lives are often healed or broken. He must know how to be lenient to the novice or the unfortunate taking the first step in the paths of wrong, and he must know how to be firm with the hardened criminal.

With a heart full of kindness, a will of iron and a knowledge of the world and the ability to read character that was almost uncanny, Judge James A. Collins became a famous municipal judge. His fame reached beyond his home city. Penologists and criminologists came from all over the world to visit his court and study his methods. Even members of the German cabinet came to Indianapolis that they might hear and see the court in action. But the judge was too good. Political powers that be enacted special legislation which prevented him from succeeding himself upon the bench. But this blow which was aimed to crush has only served to raise him the higher in the estimation of the people. His story, his methods, his ideals, are now available to the country at large, and Judge Collins is finding the Chautauqua platform a fit medium for the spreading of his humanitarian ideas.

WHAT THEY READ

Librarian's Report Showed 9,159 Books Loaned in Past Year.

The following report was read at the annual meeting of School District No. 1, Monday evening, July 13.

During the past year, from July 15, 1913-July 14, 1914 sixty-nine volumes have been added to the library; thirty-nine of which are fiction, thirteen juvenile fiction, and seventeen reference. We have received thirty-four government publications. There have been one hundred twenty-two volumes borrowed by the teachers for school use, fifty-three of which have not been returned.

Sixteen books are missing at the present time and three have been destroyed. We receive twenty of the standard periodicals. Through the courtesy of the editors the library has received each week copies of the "Lowell Ledger" and "Lowell Journal." There has been one hundred twenty-six new names enrolled during the past year. The library now has one thousand sixty patrons.

We have collected \$12.49 in fines and dues which with cash on hand at beginning of year, \$27.73 gives a total of \$40.22. Disbursements have amounted to \$15.81 leaving cash on hand \$24.41.

A NARROW ESCAPE

No damage save one horse out and bruised about the legs.
