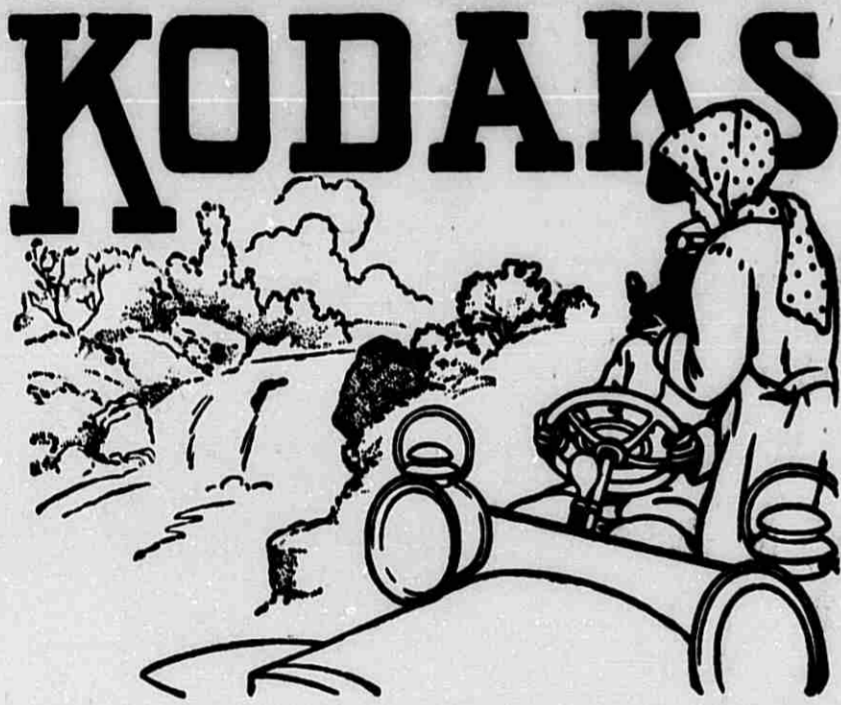

First Lowell Chautauqua Proved a Decided Success

Advance Pledge of Ticket Sales Assures Greater Success For Next Year's Chautauqua.

The first Lowell Chautauqua proved so successful and satisfactory to promoters and patrons that before its close, more than sufficient patronage was pledged for a similar event next year. The above photo shows a portion of the Saturday afternoon attendance, many hastening away before the group could be taken.

The entire program as published in this paper several times in advance was followed with but a single exception, the substitution of Fischer's Kalamazoo orchestra for Skelton's All-Star University orchestra, and it is safe to say that the change was no loss to the program. The "All-Stars" will "have to go some" if they equal Fischer's aggregation for musical entertainment.

Each entertainer and lecturer was in turn a favorite with many. The writer, speaking for himself only, would mention especially the Illinois Glee Club and lecturers Bible, Gause, Hill and Collins as especially pleasing, instructive and inspiring. The number of season tickets sold was 436, total receipts approximating \$825, and before the close of the course the sale of 559 season tickets was pledged for next year.

The Chautauqua people were so liberal in their settlement that only a small deficit—about \$25 will be carried over to next season.

READY FOR OPENING

Lowell Schools Open Next Tuesday. Enrollment Monday.

The Lowell public schools open Tuesday, September 8. On Monday there will be special examination and enrollment in the high school, but school for the grades does not open until Tuesday. The board of education has taken the usual care to make each room clean and attractive and now everything is in readiness. The fifth grade has been shifted to the Reed block, second story with Miss Morehaus as teacher.

In the high school the only change in the curriculum is that one full year in botany is offered, whereas only one semester has been offered heretofore. This is done so that horticultural agricultural botany may be emphasized. The second semester a course in Farm Management will probably be offered. Prin. Sheldon of the Michigan Agricultural College will have charge of both courses.

OLD RESIDENT GONE

Death of Orville Reynolds of West Lowell.

Orville Reynolds was born Oct. 12, 1840, in Castle, Wyoming county, N. Y., and departed this life at his home in Lowell township Aug. 29, 1914, aged 73 years, 10 months, 17 days. Funeral services were held in the Snow Methodist church at 2 p. m., Tuesday and interment in the Whitneyville cemetery, Rev. B. S. Shaw of Lowell officiating. Mr. Reynolds came to Michigan a short time before the Civil war and was one of the early teachers in this township. In 1863 he enlisted and served his country two years, being wounded on the battle field. In 1865 he settled on the farm now owned by Clyde Watterson, one-half mile south of Snow church. Twelve years later he moved onto the farm opposite the Methodist church, where he has since resided. When the Methodists organized a class in this vicinity in 1886, Mr. Reynolds took a prominent part and they held their meetings in the school house. Soon after the church was built in 1896 he was elected on the board of trustees, where he remained until his death. He has served the church in nearly every capacity, having been superintendent of Sunday school and class leader. The church loses a faithful and earnest member, who will be missed for years to come.

He is survived by his wife, Helen M., two sons and two daughters: Fred A. of Grand Rapids, Sherman P. of Lowell and Mrs. Isadore Onan and Mrs. Lois Tidd both of Lowell, and three grandchildren. Also two brothers, Wm. Reynolds and Chas. Reynolds, both of Lowell and two sisters, Mrs. Phoebe Wood of McGordis and Mrs. Emily VanCamp of Stanton, Mich., besides many other relatives.

Mr. Reynolds was a faithful Christian, a devoted husband, a good father and will be greatly missed both in the home and community.

Death of Mrs. Edwin McCue.

Mrs. Bertha McCue died Friday, August 28, at her home in West Lowell, aged 40 years. Funeral services were held Sunday at West Lowell church, Rev. Meade, pastor of the Bowne Center Methodist church officiating. The body was laid to rest in Merriam cemetery.
