

he Germans Are Being Heavily Re inforced for Great Battle On Border of East Prussia.

Paris-Desperate attempts made by the Germans on the western end o the long line of battle to break through the allies' forces which are engaged in a turning movement have resulted in the most furious fighting which as taken place since the beginning of the campaign.

After fighting without respite night and day, corps after corps of Germans was hurled against the flower of the French and English armies, only to be hrown back.

The infantry bore the brunt of the ncessant fighting, but the artillery of both armies continued throughout 24 hours to bombard each other's positions. Hand-to-hand combats occurred at many points and bayonet were


