LOWELL APPLES GOING ABROAD

CHARTERED STEAMERS TO CONVEY "SUNNY RIPES"

From Boston to England. Watts and Emory Orchards Win Fame in Foreign Markets.

John I. Gibson, secretary of the Western Michigan Development bureau, has just learned of returns that have been made to his efforts in England to sell some of Michigan's fancy apples in that country.

In a few days they will leave Boston in specially chartered steamers, large shipments of Michigan spies and baldwins, 10 carloads of which will go forward from Kent county. The apples will all be of the "Sunny Ripe" officially inspected and packed variety. Over five carloads will go from the Emory orchards at Lowell and two carloads from the orchards of W. A. Watts of Lowell. The destination will be Manchester and the goods will go to special orders, resulting directly from the efforts made by Mr. Gibson when he was abroad a year ago.

In Boston, where the apples are consigned from this city, special care is being taken to give these Kent county apples the best kind of service getting abroad, and for that reason special steamers are being chartered, so there will be no question as to prompt delivery. Kent county apples will thus prove for this county a bit of advertising that will return many fold in the future.

DRUNKS BROKE JAIL MRS. COATES BURIED

Made Easy Daylight Getaway from Lowell Jail.

Two "drunks" broke out of the Lowell jail Sunday morning between 9 and 12 o'clock, by prying the iron cell cage from the floor with a crowbar and crawling under. They escaped from the building by means of the small window on the east side, unobserved from the street; and evidently lost no time in getting out of town.

The prisoners had help from outside, the crowbar and wooden blocks having been obligingly passed to them through the cage. An attempt had been made to break the lock on the cell door; but evidently the noise of pounding caused the abandonment of that scheme.

One of the men was an ugly customer and made a vicious assault on the officer when arrested. There had been a tough gang in town for a day or so prior to the arrest; but after the jail breaking the entire party had disappeared.

Now that the weakness of the present method of confinement has been demonstrated, greater precautions will doubtless be taken in the future.

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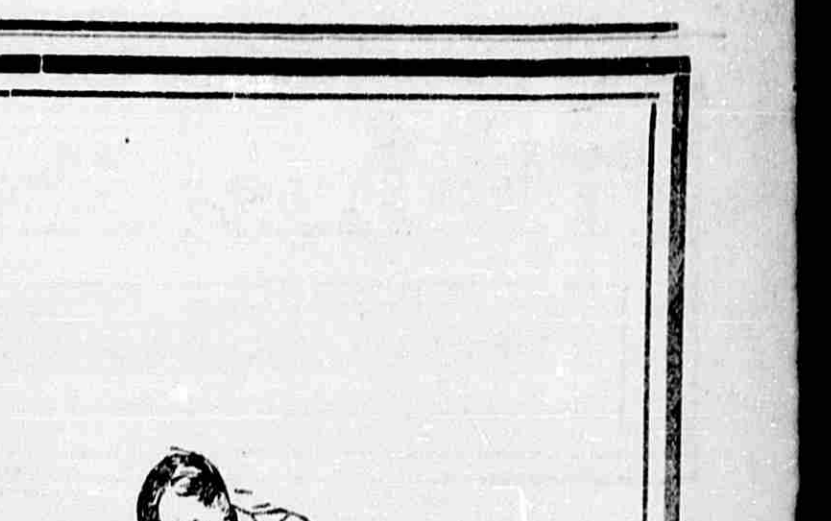

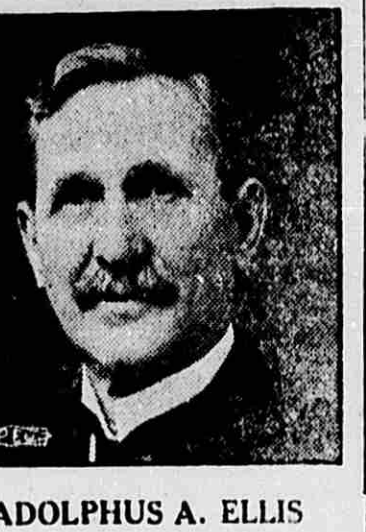
