ELEVATOR BURNED

Thomas Beany Partially Destroyed Tuesday Night.

Fire was discovered in the second story of L. P. Thomas & company's bean elevator Tuesday evening at 8:30 and it was 11 o'clock before the hard work of the firemen and volunteer assistants confined the fire to the upper floors, bean bins and roof, out the valuable stock of some 8,000 bushels of beans, mostly hand-picked, was water soaked.

The loss will probably approximate \$15,000, well covered by insurance.

The origin of the fire is unknown and it is stated there was no fire in the building after 4:30 that afternoon.

Twelve women were employed in the building hand-picking beans. Their apartment was not reached by the flames.

The Thomas company is grateful for the assistance at the fire and would thank each one individually if they were known. In the darkness and confusion they could not recognize their friends.

Preparations for rebuilding the upper story of the elevator are already making.

BUDGET UP TAXDOWN

State Taxes Will Be Lower This Fall.

The tentative draft of the county budget this year which will be submitted to the board of supervisors calls for \$182,190 as against \$179,442.50 last year. Of the total \$110,000 is for salaries; there is also a \$10,000 item this year for widows' pensions.

In spite of the fact that there is an increase of \$2,748 in the county budget the total amount of state and county taxes will be lower. Kent's portion of the state tax last year was \$544,353.37, this year it will be \$442,916.74. While there may be some changes in the budget before it finally is passed by the board of supervisors it is safe to predict that the estimate fixed by the board will not be raised. The tentative figures indicate therefore that the total of the state and county taxes will be \$605,106.87 this year, compared with \$723,795.87 last year.—Press.

STEPHEN KNAPP DEAD

Lowell Pioneer Passed Away Tuesday, Aged 92

A well known Lowell pioneer, and until the past few years a continuous resident of this village from an early date, is dead. He was a member of the Lowell Methodist church and for many years was tyler of Lowell Lodge, F. & A. M. Yesterday's Grand Rapids Press gives the following account:



Mr. Knapp as He Appeared Twenty Years Ago.

Stephen B. Knapp, one of the oldest Masons in the United States and the oldest pioneer in this state died Tuesday at the home of his son, H. H. Knapp, 843 Cottage Grove street, S. E. Mr. Knapp had been ill for several years, yet his death came rather unexpectedly. While in his usual condition Tuesday he suddenly became unconscious and died a few hours later.

Mr. Knapp was ninety-two years old and came to Michigan from New York in 1826. This was eleven years before Michigan was admitted to the Union. His early life in Michigan was spent as a school teacher and he probably was the oldest teacher in the state.

In 1852 Mr. Knapp joined the Masons in Port Huron, becoming a member of Pine Grove lodge. He was a life member of the R. A. M., and belonged to Hooker chapter No. 72 at Lowell.

When Mr. Knapp and his father reached Michigan territory, Detroit was a small city of only 5,000 inhabitants and no town of any consequence existed west of that place. His family settled on a tract of land between what are now Rochester and Pontiac. Mr. Knapp possessed the government deed for the land, which was executed and signed by President Monroe. It was issued from the Detroit land office and the land cost \$1.25 an acre.

Under President Pierce Mr. Knapp acted as postmaster at Vicksburg, Mich. He also was engaged in the lumber business in his earlier life.

Mr. Knapp suffered two strokes of paralysis about four years ago and since then had been in impaired health.

Besides H. H. Knapp, there are surviving two sons, L. D. of Chicago and Archie L. of Detroit, and one daughter, Mrs. Frank Baleom of Ionia. Two sisters, Mrs. D. R. Whitney and Mrs. I. B. Whitfield of this city and two brothers, Austin and Leonard of Minnesota also survive.

REPORT OF THE FEDERATION

BY PRESIDENT WHITE OF CLOVER LEAF CLUB

State Speakers Stand for Proper Education of Young. Condemn Social Evil and Liquor Traffic.

The Clover Leaf club held its regular meeting at the home of Mrs. R. B. Boylan November 10. Meeting called to order at 2:30 o'clock, Mrs. A. G. Peckham presiding.

After a short business session Mrs. R. T. Ford opened the program with a solo, "Roses, Roses Everywhere."

A very interesting report of the recent Federation at Adrian was given by the president, Mrs. F. E. White.

"It is through the agency of federal clubs that women of all classes are seen working shoulder to shoulder for the betterment of mankind. Mrs. Chamberlain declared that it had been successfully demonstrated that women could carry on their social welfare labors without disrupting the home, and that the home was better for the organized efforts which were being put forth."

Prof. O'Shea of Wisconsin University made an earnest and frank plea for a return to natural methods for the child development. He said, "Modern children reach the age of twenty stupefied with pleasures of the senses, and that there is little of mystery to stimulate their development beyond this period. The moving picture show, the modern dance and the modern social plan are the main factors in producing this condition. Always keep something ahead of the child, encourage the right kind of play for the children and keep them out of doors where they can study nature. Keep the youth young, docile and growing for a long time, always demanding that things should be done in the open. You can never solve a question by suppression."

Dr. Yarrows of Hull House said, "The most contagious and by far the most dangerous evils at work today are the social diseases; and it is the duty of every American citizen to wipe out the commercialized houses of vice. Let Michigan, one of the most progressive states in the union, take a firm stand along this line. Let us take the same to wipe out social diseases that we have tuberculosis. Build hospitals where the people afflicted with these diseases can be properly treated. Protect the young of Michigan by the demand for a certificate of health signed by a physician accompanying the marriage license. Parents should know the son-in-law or daughter-in-law before they are taken into the home."

Let us all remember first, to protect the children; second, to protect the children; third to protect the children; so as to cut off the supply of prostitution. Guard our youth. Teach sex hygiene. Educate, educate, educate. Educate the young in the results of sin; and where we as parents make our boys to understand they are free moral agents, that they are responsible for the vitality and freedom of their descendants, that they were created creators, we arm them with the best weapon for their defense. Where we teach our girls not to tempt men, and instruct them how best to avoid dangers that lead to prostitution we give them more power to protect themselves than can ever come from the ignorance, which is by no means innocence. She pleaded for a single standard of morals as an aid to the solution.

Chaplain E. H. Lougher of the Michigan State prison at Jackson came to the federation, not as an entertainer, but as a representative of the women and children whose lives have been sacrificed to the thing called crime. He said in part, "We love to tell of the glory of our flag, the progress of our civilization, and the sincerity of our Christianity, but in spite of it all, last year we convicted more murderers than any other civilized country in the world. Nine thousand times last year did the assassin's knife flash out, or the criminal's bullet speed on its way to life's destruction. Twenty-six thousand, nine hundred cases can be laid at the door of the most damnable traffic that ever cursed this state, and if the women of Michigan would arise it could be banished from our state, and thus save the manhood of Michigan. In fixing the responsibility for the committing of crime the speaker said "I put a large part upon his teacher who should have dragged his life, clear off the rocks. The laxness in the American home is doing more than anything to fill the prisons. Side by side with the saloon, in the downfall of the young, is the uncensored, unlicensed nickel show. The censored ones are educational to a degree, and are entertaining, but even these are not faultless, and should be fed but sparingly to boys and girls of 14 or 15."

Audacious Reported to Have Been Victim of Mine Off the Irish Coast.

IS FIRST-CLASS BATTLESHIP

Commissioned in 1912, of Twenty-Five Thousand Tons Burden—German Forced to Evacuate Diemied—Rumored to Have Been Destroyed in East Prussia.

London, Nov. 14.—Although no official statement has been made from information received to confirm it, it is possible that the British battle-ship "Audacious" was a victim of a mine or of a boiler magazine explosion last week in the Irish sea.

The "Audacious" was a 25,000-ton first class battleship. It was commissioned September, 1912. It carried 12 12-inch guns and 16 four-inch guns. It had a speed of 21 knots.

The Standard prints a report, which the press bureau permits, that two of the German submarines were seen on Nov. 12, 1914, in the vicinity of the "Audacious" in the Irish sea.

It is understood that these picked troops had been brought ashore to act against an order to force the vessel through at points where previous efforts made by the infantry of the line had failed.

One of these submarines has been carrying out a series of daring raids in the vicinity of the Dover straits, and it is reported that an attempt by this German craft to torpedo it.
