The building proposed, as may be seen by the plans displayed in U. B. Williams' jewelry store, is in the shape of a "T." It is designed that the building rest upon the present site. The main part or cross bar of the "T" is 40 x 65 and contains all grade and class rooms. Running perpendicular to this is a section 85 x 60. This department has two stories and contains a gymnasium below 85 x 60 and a high school assembly room 65 x 60 above. The assembly room is large enough for an auditorium. as it has a seating capacity of 350 people or a school seating capacity of 250 students. At the end is a stage 20 x 30 with dressing rooms. This space can be used for recitation rooms should pressure demand it. The main part of the building has two stories and a basement. The basement contains the heating plant, toilets, storerooms, domestic science and manual training rooms, and first and second grade rooms. The latter are situated in the south end where they will nave a separate entrance and full sized windows. On the first floor are grades 3 to 8 inclusive. Besides these are the superintendent's office and kindergarten. On the top floor or second story are

he laboratories and class rooms of the high school. Space does not permit a detailed description of the rooms, but the reader is referred to the exhibited plans for full particulars. To those who have not given he matter careful consideration it may appear that the proposed plant is unnecessarily large. But et us consider a few of the facts. Without considering the South ward, the isolation of which makes its inclusion impossible,

the consolidation of the East and West wards would be a great saving. The West ward janitor would be unnecessary, the fuel bill, it is estimated, would shrink from \$930, last year's coal bill, to something like \$500, and this latter is based upon the cost of operation of the Alma plant. Again, complete consolidation would eliminate one teacher. Telephone service, repairs and supervision would be cut down, and more efficient coordination could surely be secured.
