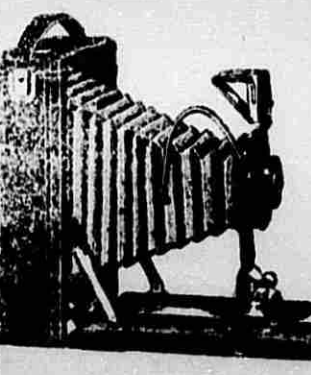

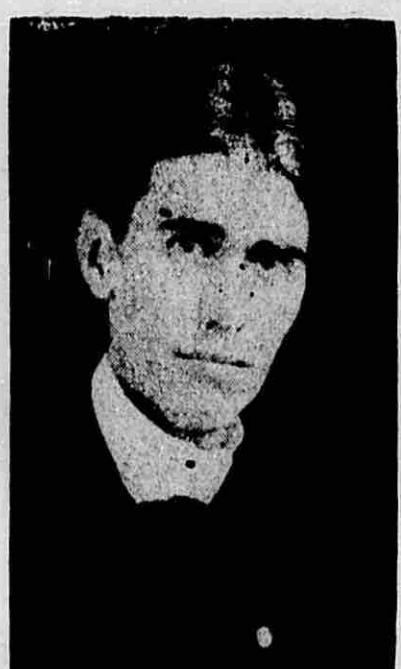

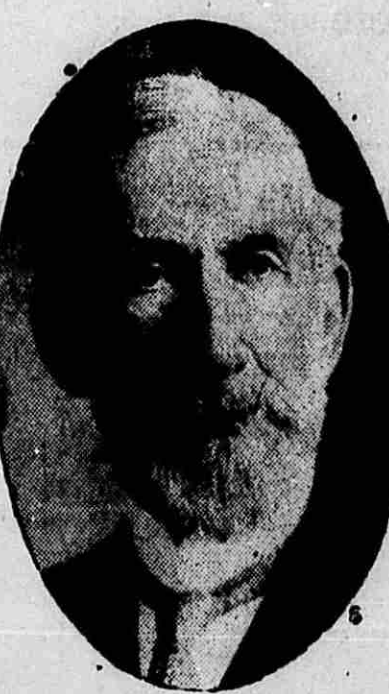


TOASTMASTER BREADY

OLD LOWELL FIRM IN THE OPEN FORUM.

Burned Out In Grand Rapids Monday.

Tuesday's Herald has the following account of a misfortune suffered by the old Lowell firm of Loveland & Hinyan now located in that city.

As the result of an exploding oil stove the Loveland & Hinyan Wholesale Produce company warehouse at 236-248 Prescott street, S. E., was visited by a fire shortly before noon yesterday, which caused a loss of between \$10,000 and \$12,000. The amount is practically covered by insurance. The loss to the building and stock is in the neighborhood of \$7,000. The remainder was brought about through the destruction of beans and other produce.

The blaze started when an oil stove which had been used in the two story structure for the purpose of thawing out water pipes, exploded. In attempting to subdue the flames F. W. Hinyan, president and general manager of the company, sustained slight burns about the face, while his hair and eyebrows were singed. The building was destroyed. Plans will be considered soon for the rebuilding of the structure, it was stated last night.

Voters of Lowell— You are called on to vote for the third time, within six weeks, on the proposition to bond Lowell for a fifty thousand dollar school house.

The School Board in last week's Ledger refer to the majority as the opposition, and most graciously consent to being interviewed, but appoint no time or place. If it is the sincere desire of the petitioners and the firm resolve of the School Board, which they assert, to build the school house for the paltry sum of fifty thousand dollars, why do they bother to call a third meeting?

The good book says, "The servant is not above his Master," but our School Board take no stock in that doctrine. They evidently consider themselves far and away above and beyond the voters who made them. Why this haste to plunge this town deeper into debt? If the house we have, were repaired and repaired at a small expense, it would look better and be better than ever. The interest on fifty thousand dollars for five years, would mean fifteen thousand dollars to apply on a new house, which should cost not to exceed thirty-five thousand dollars. Why should we build to accommodate foreign students as we lose ten dollars on every such student each year? When Lowell is bonded say fifty thousand dollars for the water works and another fifty thousand for a new school house on top of the big debt that Lowell is now staggering under, we shall all wish our homes were where they could escape the bondholders tight grips. Some parties who have bought lots, intending to build homes, now declare they will not build, if this proposition carries and our bonded indebtedness is so enormously increased. Why build a school house at this time, that is out of all proportion in expense to our own homes, when we know it means a first mortgage on our homes?

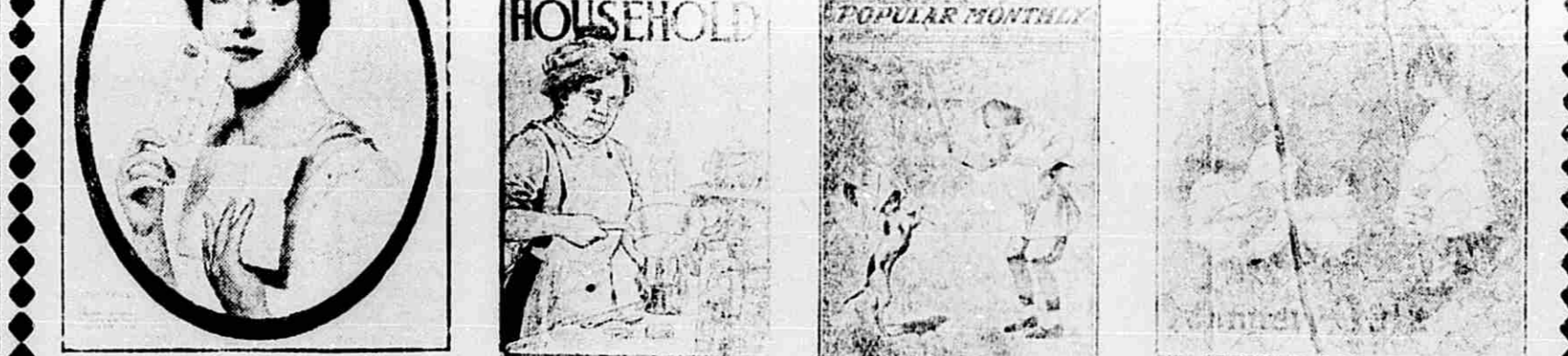
