ABOUT NINE MIL-LION DOLLARS IN CURRENCY IS PRODUCED EVERY DAYAT THE GREAT NEWPLANTOFTHE BUREAU OF EN-GRAVING AND PRINTINGAT WASHINGTON

By EDWARD B. CLARK.

N ONE building during the year ending June 30, 1915, Uncle Sam made thirty and a half billion dollars. This money factory is called the bureau of engraving and printing. Uncle Sam is the head of the corporation which is actively engaged in the production of wealth, and he has with him as other members of the

firm about one hundred million nephews and nieces. This governmental factory produces paper money, bonds, revenue, postage and custom stamps, checks, drafts and all the important documents printed from engraved plates. The director of the bureau of engraving and printing is Joseph E. Ralph. He might be called the foreman of the greatest money-making shop in the United States of America and perhaps in the world. From Director Ralph's own words we learn some-

of the capital city: "The daily output of United States notes, gold and silver certificates and national bank notes, is two and one-quarter million notes, having a face value of nine million dollars and weighing over three and a half tons. If laid out flat they would cover nine acres, and if placed end to end the daily output would make a chain two hundred and fifty miles long.

thing specific about the activities of this big shop

"Each day forty million postage stamps are manufactured, which would cover approximately seven acres, or make a chain of stamps six hundred and twenty miles long. The value of each day's stamp output is nearly seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Six hundred employees are engaged in stamp manufacture. Fifty-one different kinds of postage stamps, in denominations from one cent to five dollars, are made for the United States and its insular possessions. They are printed in fifteen distinctive colors.

"Another important part of the bureau's work is internal revenue stamps through which an annual income of over five hundred million dollars is collected for Uncle Sam. These stamps are of larger size than postage stamps, and while the daily output is only twenty million stamps, they would cover twenty acres if spread out in single sheets, and they weigh six and a half tons. More than three hundred different varieties are issued."

In Uncle Sam's workshop is made all the paper money for the United States government. This means that every man who has a dollar bill in his hand, or who is lucky enough to have a bill of larger denomination, may know of a certainty that its origin was in a factory situated at the corner of Fourteenth and C streets, S. W., in the city of Washington, D. C.

And speaking of counterfeits, there is a thing of marked interest which might be said. The bureau of engraving and printing was organized under an act of July 11, 1862. From that day to this the government has done its own work. It has employed the most skillful engravers that it can find and it is a matter of pride today to this government that never in the history of the bureau has one of its employees been engaged in the work of counterfeiting. It is true that counterfeiting goes on occasionally in different places throughout the United States, but in the hundreds of arrests which have been made of men and women engaged in the work, not one ever had been in the employment of the government, and not one was found to be in collusion with any of

Concerning the matter of engraving, Director Ralph of the bureau has had this to say:

"The engraving division is the corner stone of the bureau and the bulwark of our securities. In this division every form of security has its origin, and the most artistic and skilled engravers that the world produces are employed here.

"Steel engraving is the perfection of art as applied to securities; it differs from painting and sculpturing, inasmuch as the engraver who carves his work on steel plates must deliberately study the effect of each infinitesimal line. Free hand, with a diamond-pointed tool, known as a graver, aided by a powerful magnifying glass, he carves away, conscious that one false cut or slip of his tool, or miscalculation of depth or width of line will destroy the artistic merit of his creation, and weeks or months of labor will have been in vain.

Good literature was never so cheap and never so widely read. Low cost of mailing, fathered by Thomas Jefferson, has passed the benefit on to the people. High mailing cost means high priced papers and magazines, a burden that the public will have to bear and for which there will be no adequate return. Penny letter postage may come in time; but just now while the government is striving to increase its revenues for defense is a poor time to proprose it. When it does come, it will not be to relieve the mail order houses at the expense of the populace.

THERE was a time in the history of slavery when it would have been possible to have secured compensation for the property loss involved in emancipation. 

There are few regular army officers today who are unwilling to give General Schofield credit for hard sense and keen foresight. Field guns are doing the work in Europe today, and field guns, at the present time, mean something more than three-inch rifles and the smaller weapons by courtesy called cannon. Siege guns have become field guns. Heavy artillery also can be moved, laboriously it is true, but nevertheless successfully, from one point to another. Artillery seems to be the prime weapon of modern war-

Artillery First Requisite.

Army officers in Washington are alive to the situation. They want a well-balanced army, of course, and they will resent any attempt to cut down other branches to increase the force of artillery they probably will be willing that sacrifices in other branches shall be made. What they want, however, is enough field guns, and enough ammunition to serve them, to make certain the efficiency of the

field artillery forces. When your correspondent was at the front in France, near the Argonne Potomac lies the city of Washington. fine rock particles in the soil. later in the trenches in Lorraine, he got some realizing sense of what artillery means in this war, and, moreover, he learned definitely the necessity of unlimited ammunition for the guns in service.

When the president announced his intention of going to Fortress Monroe to have a few days time in which to think on whom to appoint to succeed Lindley M. Garrison, his former secretary of war, he had one other object in view, namely, the inspection of the defenses at Fortress Monroe and of the site of the proposed additional defenses at Cape Henry. He wanted to learn at first hand something about the big guns and the water approaches which they command.

There is one element in the preparedness plan upon which army officers and legislators fixed their minds prior to the great war in Europe and, of course therefore, prior to the time of the arousing of interest in this country in the subject of quick preparation for defense. (2) Establish a sound and regular rotation of crops.-It is difficult to make a general rule as to crop rotations, because rotations vary with local conditions, but there are some rules in this regard that hold anywhere. A two-year rotation, such as corn and oats, is entirely inadequate. Every rotation should include at least one legume crop. The rotation should be planned with the aid of your county agent or your state agricultural college to fit the individual farm and local conditions.

Care Must Be Taken That Element That Will Harm Color Is Not Em-

imes a color element, and most often dirt, which has been unconsciously gathered and has adhered to the fiber. Some grease-removing agents will harm color. These are ammonia, ether and sometimes chloroform. If to prevent wetting the material it seems wise to use either of these chemicals, they should be tested by a sample or on some hidden part of the garment to find out if they affect the color. Testing is the only sure way of knowing. 


