



BREAD MADE IN A HURRY

Break two cakes of yeast into one cup of water at blood temperature. Put a tablespoonful of sugar on the yeast to stimulate its quick growth. While this soaks, warm two cupfuls of milk with one cupful of water. This, with the water over the yeast, makes a quart of wetting, sufficient for four loaves.

In a large mixing bowl put several sieves of flour and make a depression in the middle of the flour, into which put a level tablespoonful of salt and a heaping tablespoonful of lard. Pour the liquid and the yeast upon the four and mix with the hands, working the flour from the outside into the liquid in the middle of the mass. New German Aircraft. Details regarding a Teuten hydreaeroplane which fell into the hands of the Russians in the Riga region are of unusual interest in that they disclose the thoroughness with which Germar air craft are finished and equipped. To quote from the report of the Morning Post correspondent at Petrograd: "All the necessary manipulating parts of the machinery are made luminous at night with a radium composition. There is a special newly invented lever to facilitate handling the plane in darkness, and a special compass, and seats are provided for three. The hydroaereplane carries a searchlight, a maxim, and a rifle, with an adequate supply of ammunition. and the bombs, five on each side, of ten pounds weight apiece."



> If it were not for one tiny, erratic break in nature's orderly progression. we should never have had the machinery that has brought about modern civilization. For we should not have had steel. It is true we should have annals of the state has taken place had iron, but pure iron is almost use here. less. It is only when a small quantity of carbon is added to it that it becomes hard enough to take a cutting

edge. Then it is called steel. Why steel hardens is an unsolved problem. The Scientific American reproduces some extracts from an address before the British Institute of Mechanical Engineers, delivered by Professor Arnold, who had for many years been investigating the chemical and mechanical relations between iron, carbon and other metals, and Sir Robert Hadfield's experiments that called attention to this "break" in the order of nature which alone makes

steel possible. Nickel and cobalt are so closely re lated to iron in their properties and in their position in the periodic classification - atomic weights, specific gravity, fusing point and valence being almost the same-that it might be expected they would behave identically when united with carbon. Not so however. Sir Robert Hadfield found that when the "steel" made of nickel and cobalt was heated or hammered the carbon came out of the composi tion and was precipitated as graphite If iron behaved this way tool steel would turn to cast iron as soon as heated; and it is on the fact that it does not-"a seemingly quite erratic orderly plan"-that modern manufacture is founded.





USING COLD POTATOES

MAY BE EMPLOYED IN A VARIETY OF WAYS.

Some of the Recipes Which Call for Remnants Are Really Improved by Using Potatoes That Have Been Cooked.

Left Over Whole Cold .- Cut cold, boiled potatoes into thin slices lengthwise, dip each slice in a little melted butter, dust with salt and pepper, bioil over a clear fire until a golden

Lyonnaise Potatocs.-Cut cold boiled potatoes into small dice; to each pint ailow a tablespoonful of butter, put the butter in an ordinary pan, melt it, add a tablespoonful of chopped onion, shake until the onion is golden brown; throw in the potatoes, shake or toss over a hot fire until each piece is slig y browned; sprinkle lightly with haif a tenspoonful of salt, a tablespoonful of parsley and a dash

of pepper; dish and serve. Potato Cakes,-Broken bits of mashed, seasoned with a little milk salt to taste, chopped parsley or not, formed in round flat cakes, half-inch thick; brown in butter drippings or wheeled and demanded angrily: "What salt pork fat on each side, serving hell's trick is this?" > Potatoes and Cabbage Cakes .- Take some cold potatoes and cabbage, equal quantities of both; mash smoothly together, adding beaten egg. white sauce ov melted butter to moisten. Flavor rather highly with pepper, add a little salt. Form into round cakes; flour, bake or fry. Potato and Rice Cakes .- Take any

remains of mashed potato, add half the quantity of boiled rice, mig all together with a little butter, season well with pepper, salt and cayenne. Roll on a floured board to about an inch and a half thickness, cut into rounds or squares with a cutter. Bresh over with beaten egg and bake in a fast oven. Serve hot. Potatoes and Egg au Gratin .-

Take six or seven baked or botted potatoes, cut them in slices, and slice two hard boiled eggs. Place them in layers in a baking dish, sprinkling each layer with grated cheese.
