

to its coming. We wish to congratulate you on your efforts to vote Michigan dry. Many people thought Oregon was dry but the law allowed a person to get two quarts of whiskey or twenty-four quarts of beer every twenty-eight days; the saloons and breweries were closed: Now we have voted a "bone dry" state and it sure has a more refined and decent look than when first struck the West.

I picked up an Eastern paper last week and read about how things were tied up in the West. Well, there is a car shortage on the railroad, but I have seen as high as one hundred and fifteen carloads of lumber go through our terminal to Eastern markets and the lumber still keeps coming. The demand for cars is greater everywhere in the West than ever before, which shows that business is picking up. And thank goodness, we have Wilson at the helm for another four years.





Stir often and keep well skimmed. Put into dry jars and when cold tie down.

The rule is one level teaspoonful of cassia, one-half teaspoonful of ginger, one-fourth teaspoonful of cloves and and one-fourth teaspoonful of nutmeg. Bake from five to seven hours in a moderate oven.

Let stand in a warm place about half an hour.-Good Housekeeping.





Prepared in This Way, the Meat Will Be Found Both Appetizing and Digestible.

After carefully wiping the meat with wet towel, lay it on a rack in the dripping pan and place it in a very hot oven, where it will quickly sear over on all sides. Then reduce the heat of the oven and pour into the pan with the fat, which has come from the roast, a cupful of hot water.

Now cut in small pieces two large tart apples and put these into the pan where, cooking, they will give up their acid.

Baste the meat very often with this liquid, adding water when necessary. letting the pork cook slowly and thoroughly. Senson with salt and pepper when half done.

A little flour may be dredged over the roast at intervals and a few sage leaves powdered may be sprinkled over it. Sage and pepper scorch easily and must be frequently basted. Apple sauce and horseradish may

accompany the roast pork as usual. When the roast is done take it up and pour off all the drippings except to retain the brown substance at the bottom.

The New York Stock Exchange has ruled to forbid clerks of any member of the exchange, or of any broker, bank, trust or insurance company, from carrying any speculative account, directly or indirectly, unless the written consent of the clerk's employer is given.

This rule says, in effect, that in the judgment of the New York Stock Exchange (and it ought to know), speculating is dangerous for persons of small means.

Clerks-and all others who cannot afford to lose-ought to see the significance of this ruling, and take care that their savings are invested where they CANNOT lose them-but where they will earn the largest interest consistent with absolute safety.




