Dr. Edward Everett Hale is best known to the present generation as a writer of fiction that has taken a high and deserved place in American literature. His immortal short story, "The Man Without a Country," was pubished anonymously in the Atlantic Monthly in 1863 and collected with other stories in a volume issued five years afterward.

Great as were Doctor Hale's contributions to the literature of his country, there is nothing in all his works which will live longer than his portrayal of Philip Nolan's unfortunate career. Since its first publication, now many years more than half a century ago, it has been considered a masterpicce of literature as well as an unequaled inspiration to patriotism. Especially to the young and impetuous does the story make a thrilling appeal and at the same time teaches a stern lesson. No American can read it without a keener sense of the duty which he owes to his country.
