



The Kent Transit Co. incorporated, is the name of a new company organized to run a bus line service between Lowell and Grand Rapids, beginning Monday, July 23, at 7 a. m., at which time the first car will leave Lowell for Grand Rapids by way of Alto, McCords, Whitneyville and Cascade. At 7, a. m., also a car will leave Grand Rapids for Lowell by way of Ada. Cars run each way every four hours thereafter, four round trips daily.
