The money has been taken in at the Auxiliary as membership fees and \$1.00 was donated by the Lady Maccabees.

Mezdamess Atwater, McDannell and Misses Dickey and DeWert donated old tablecloths from which the napkins and tray cloths were made and the Methodist Aid society gave the dozen housewives.

From all reports our American soldiers will be on the firing line in about a week and many more will be sent across to France, so it is our duty as American women to do our little, and we can best do that by lining up in the Red Cross work.

The boys will need so many things that only women can make, so let everyone who can, lend a helping hand to this work. The auxiliary is open every Wednesday and Thursday afternoon. Are you there helping?

## LAVENDER FREED

Size of His Foot Proves Accused Man Innocent.

The size of the shoes worn by Marvin Lavender, a seventy-eight-year-old farmer residing near Lowell, played a conspicuous part in a trial in Justice Loucks' court.

Bert Hill, who lives across the road from Lavender, admitted a patch of grass in the road near his home to such an extent he placed a barbed wire fence around it. Within this enclosure he placed several horses.

Two nights later some one cut the barbed wire, and the horses were turned loose. Hills suspected Lavender of being the nocturnal destroyer of the barbed wire entanglement. His suspicions became stronger when, it is said, he saw footprints leading to Lavender's house from the patch of grass.

With a twig he measured the length of the footprints. This twig, with the measurements indicated, he gave a deputy sheriff. The deputy visited Lavender and demanded he hold up his foot. Lavender did so. The twig was applied to the sole. It was almost an inch short.

Nevertheless Hill brought suit against Lavender on charge of destroying property. The twig and Lavender's foot were produced in evidence. A jury decided some one else made the footprints and destroyed the wire fence. The patch of grass now is open to any roving stock that may choose to feed there.—Press.

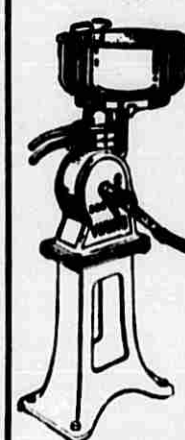
