DIGGING BIG DITCH

Work Now Under Way on Western Michigan's Biggest Drain Project.

The construction of the Coldwater river drain, one of the largest drain projects in western Michigan, is progressing rapidly and satisfactorily.

The only appeal from the assessment of the district affected, consisting of 64,000 acres, was made by George J. Nagler of Bowne township, a miller near Freeport, who operates his mill by water power obtained from a dam near the point the work was begun.

Another mesh in this network of drains has been petitioned for by residents in the neighborhood of Pratt lake. This drain, to be known as the Pratt lake drain, will empty into Tyler creek a half mile north of the Coldwater river drain, and its construction will eliminate an old mill operated by water power owned by Daniel Laver of Bowne township.
