Mrs. T. F. DOYLE PASSED AWAY SUNDAY.

Mary Doyle was born in Grattan township, Kent county, Michigan, January 15, 1854. Her maiden name was Mary Byrne. She grew to womanhood on her father's farm near Crooked lake about 12 miles north of Lowell. April 15, 1876, she was united in marriage to Thomas F. Doyle of Vergennes township. To this union were born six children, four of whom now survive as follows, Chas. Doyle, Mrs. R. M. Shivel and T. M. Doyle of Lowell and Sergeant William C. Doyle of Camp Custer, Michigan.

Mrs. Doyle was preceded in death by her husband, Thomas F. Doyle. They were both known in this community and elsewhere.
