A GREAT MEETING

Liberty Loan Rally Great in Crowd and Able Speakers.

The Liberty Loan rally at the Lowell City hall Friday evening, April 12, passed off according to schedule; and proved all that its most sagacious promoters hoped for—a rousing, inspiring success.

A crowded house, war-time music and splendid addresses, made a memorable occasion. If there were any slackers present their ears must be burning yet.

Open air music by the volunteer band preceded the exercises in the hall.

P. Hicks had charge on the platform and handled the affair in his usual vigorous style.

Mrs. A. G. Peckham, chairman of the Lowell ladies' Loan Drive committee, made a few remarks introducing Mrs. Mills of Grand Rapids, who gave one of the finest addresses ever heard in Lowell.

Rev. A. W. Wishart, also of Grand Rapids, and well known to Lowell audiences, sustained his high reputation as an able speaker, in an address replete with information, historical as well as contemporary. Both speakers urged support to the limit of their Liberty Loan drive and all war work; and left their hearers imbued with the determination to fight the war through to a successful finish to determine that democracy, not plutocracy, shall rule the world.

Appropriate vocal numbers were rendered by a quartet of ladies from the St. Cecilia society of Grand Rapids and by the Lowell male quartet; and the program closed with the singing of America by the assemblage.

CLEAN-UP DAYS APRIL 23 AND 24TH.

Liberty Bonds Sold in Lowell \$51,800 to April 17.

The Third Liberty Loan drive in Lowell and vicinity is progressing satisfactorily and committees are making encouraging reports. It is expected if all do their duty in proportion to their ability, as well as those who have already purchased bonds, Lowell will "go over the top" in line shape and be entitled to receive the Liberty Loan Honor flag.

Up to last night, total sales reported by the Lowell banks were \$51,800.

Regarding the publication of names of Liberty Loan bond buyers, some have objected to the use of their names for such purpose; and it is thought best to publish none. The purpose was an incentive to the drive; but it is felt that Lowell and vicinity people will do their best without it, from a sense of right and loyalty alone. Another raising rally is expected during the campaign which closes May 4, with the presence of a Grand Rapids band and Editor A. H. Vandenberg of The Herald; but date has not been announced. Watch for it.

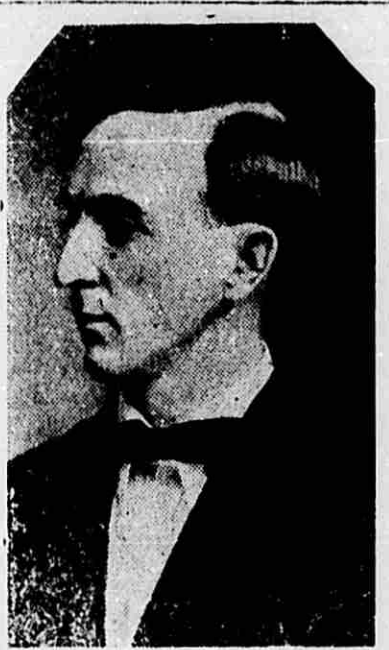

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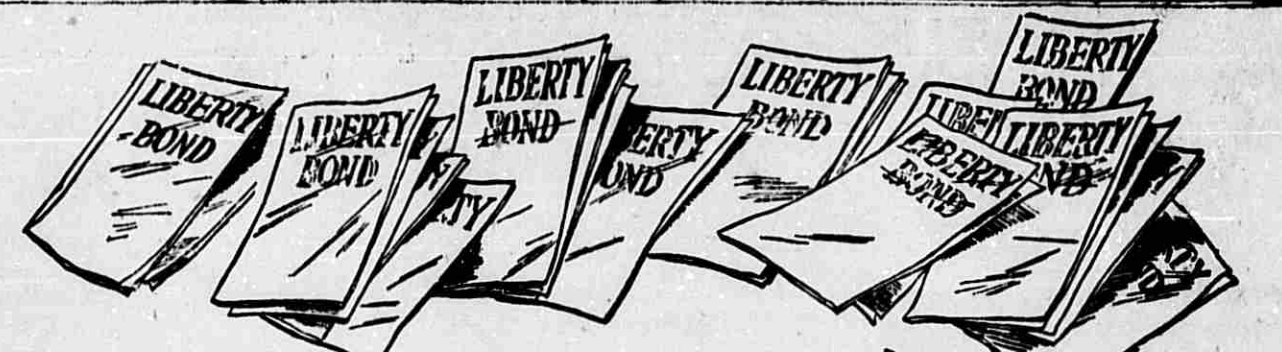
