Rev. Fr. Ellig's address dealt with education in school and out. Education in its early stages is the work of the teachers. Gradually as the pupil progresses, he becomes his own educator with the teachers directing aid. Now at graduating time, the young people must continue as self educators through life, their work thus far being only the beginning. Education out of school must be by three methods: observation, intercourse with others, preferably with those wiser than ourselves, and lastly through reading of books. Elucidation of this point occupied the greater part of the address; and its importance was impressed upon the graduates by liberal citations and quotations from eminent men. Reading of biographies and at least one chapter of the New Testament every day were especially recommended.

## LITTLE ONES DROWN OUR BEST FRIENDS ANDERSON HONORED

**Dorothy and Frankie Hoffman Lose Lives in Flat River.**

This community was shocked by the drowning of Dorothy Mae and George Frank, little daughter and son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Hoffman, last Friday.

The children left home at 10:30 that morning and had been playing on the bank of Flat river below the Pere Marquette bridge, just across the channel from the island. The water is very swift at that point and they were swept away and drowned before a warning was given of their fate. Little Louie Rice was the only witness and little can be learned of him just how the tragedy occurred. Friends kindly joined in the search for the bodies. That of Dorothy was found at the mouth of Flat river and that of Frankie in Grand river 1 1/2 miles from the place where he entered the water.

Funeral services were held at the home at 2 p. m. Monday, Rev. W. M. P. Jerrett officiating, and the little ones were buried at Oakwood in one casket.

Dorothy was born February 3, 1913, and Frankie December 26, 1914. Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman have two other children, Elizabeth aged 7 years and Robert aged 1 year.

Mr. Anderson responded very feelingly and appreciatively to the tributes that had been paid to him and said that no matter what might come to him he would never forget this occasion and that no place would ever mean so much to him as Lowell. He, too, spoke of the non-Masons present and the different creeds represented and predicted that after the war it would be found that there is one creed that is broad enough for all—the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man.

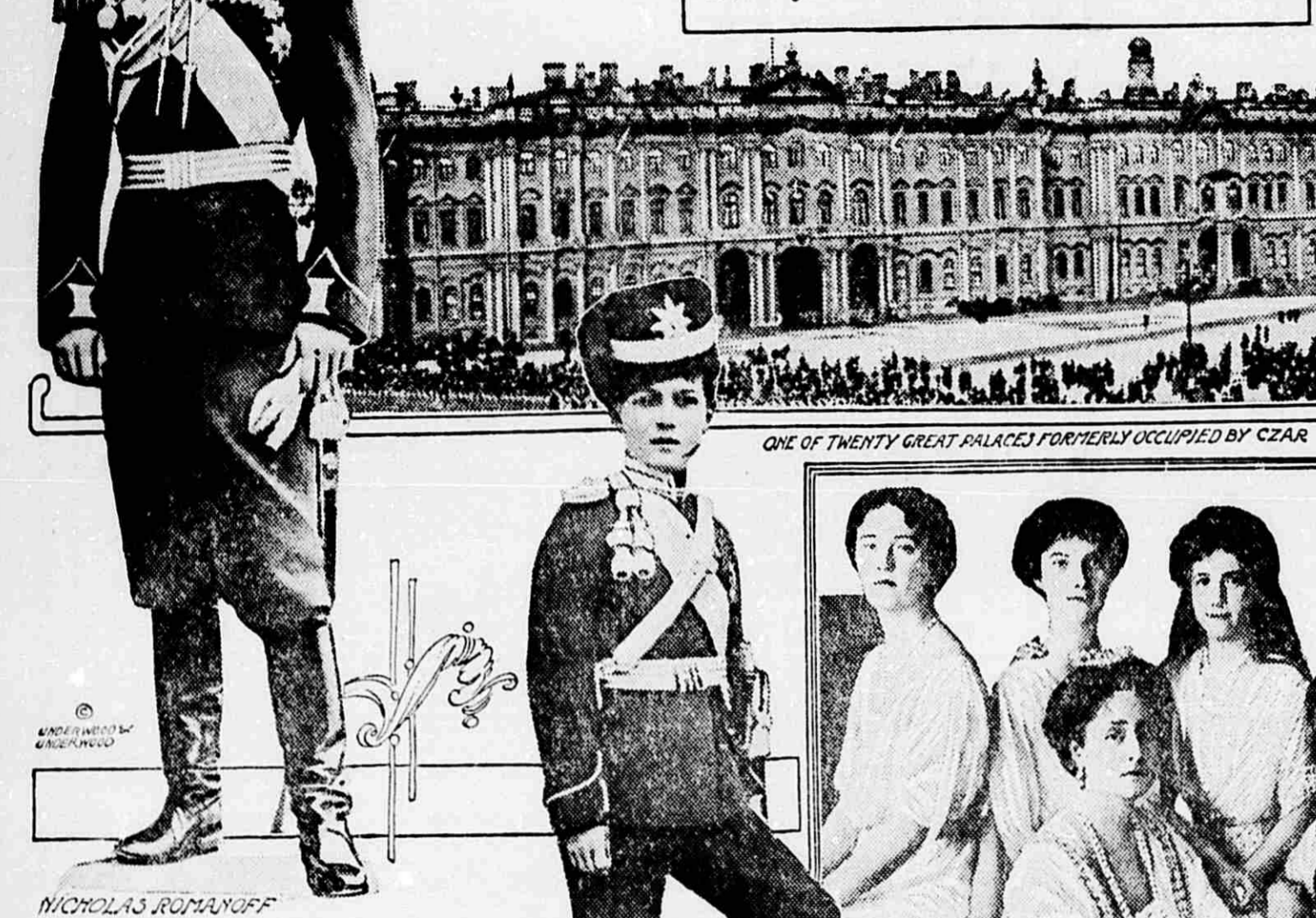
