We must see that the morale of our men and that of those who fight with us is kept at high tide. We can do so if they can feel our support all of the time.

Now is the great opportunity of the American people to demonstrate that our form of government is a success. If we do not all of us, at once, voluntarily and willingly get tehind those who fight and die for us, in every phase of our life, and now particularly realize that food is powder to win the war, then we are going to fail in this, our immediate pressing duty, and be a despised and humiliated nation. We must be a great united democracy fighting our way forward toward a final victory. There can be but one outcome of this war and we must steel ourselves for any misfortune, for any reverse, with our minds united and fixed upon the idea of a final vic-
