The Food Administration by permission of the White House makes public the following letter, written by Mr. Hoover to the President: 11 July, 1918.

Dear Mr. President: It is now possible to summarize the shipments of foodstuffs from the United States to the Allied countries during the fiscal year just closed—practically the last harvest year. These amounts include all shipments to Allied countries for their and our armies, the civilian population, the Belgian Relief and Red Cross. The figures indicate the measure of effort of the American people in support of Allied food supplies.

The total value of these food shipments which were in the main purchased through, or with the collaboration of, the Food Administration, amount to, roughly, \$1,400,000,000 during the fiscal year.

Our slaughtering animals at the beginning of the last fiscal year were not appreciably larger than the year before and particularly in hogs; they were probably less.
