Jackson—Michigan taxpayers received a net profit of \$330,813.53 from the Michigan state prison at Jackson for the year ending June 30, 1918, after deduction of \$61,873.81 for depreciations on buildings, machinery and equipment and \$63,883.35 for wages paid in labor, had been made. This record, as shown by the annual report of the prison made Friday by Edward Frensdorf, chairman of the board of control, who relinquished the control of the prison to the new warden after 11 months as acting warden of the institution, is unequalled in any other penal institution in the United States.






