Delos H. Owen, Citizens Telephone Manager Twenty Years. The body of Delos H. Owen was found in Grand river Tuesday morning, following his disappearance the night before after leaving a note at his office which caused fears for his safety.

Justice Andrews was summoned and impaneled the following jurors: Charles Doyle, Earl Thomas, C. Bergin, F. N. White, Geo. M. Parker and A. G. Peckham. An inquest will be held this (Thursday) morning at 10 o'clock.

The body was taken in charge by Bruce G. Falles of the Miller & Harris company.

Mr. Owen had come to be regarded as an old resident, having been local manager of the Citizens Telephone company here for twenty years. Prior to that time he was in the shoe business here with Butts & Owen several years. He was a capable business man and generally a jovial and likable fellow; but like the most of us, he had his faults. He was 51 years old and leaves a wife and two children.

Funeral services will be held at the home Friday at 2 o'clock p. m. Rev. A. H. Lash officiating clergyman; burial in Oakwood cemetery.

A PUBLICITY REMEDY

Recommended by Grand Rapids Herald in Ringing Editorial.

Just as soon as the "Vigilance Committee," connected with Grand Rapids' Fourth Liberty Loan organization, finds its first real slacker and publishes its report on him on the front page of the newspapers of this city, Grand Rapids' troubles upon this score will be over. And the bigger the fish, the bigger the haul.

Publicity is a most salutary medicine. Lansing subscribed her Fourth Liberty Loan quota in ten hours on the Volunteer Plan a plan by the way, which Lansing originated; and in the Herald's judgment, one of the reasons for this record is the fact that at the end of the last Liberty Loan Campaign, Lansing's "Vigilance Committee" published the records of about twenty men who had not done their duty. Down in Lansing, fraction-patriots take no further chances on monkeying with the buzz-saw. Indeed, Lansing is cleaned of fraction-patriots for keeps. Publicity works about the same in one place as in another.

If there had been a blackboard on the front of every block Chairman's house during Grand Rapids' three Volunteer days, and every subscription had been chalked up where the neighbors might see for themselves what Liberty Loan subscribers were doing, we venture the assertion that our totals would have run several million dollars in excess of what they did. Such is the average man's respect for public opinion.

Ninety-five per cent of our people made fine records for themselves (whereof some publicly would be creditable to them.) But the record of the whole city is suffering day-to-day humiliation because of the records of the other five per cent who have tried to settle with Uncle Sam for less than one hundred cents on the dollar. The Liberty Loan problem—now and hereafter—is to reach this five per cent.

The Herald believes that the remedy is PUBLICITY. Modesty is a commendable trait; and "modesty" is a word which is often used against making public all information regarding private subscriptions to Liberty Loans, War Chests, etc. But when "modesty" becomes "cowardice" in some instances, it is time for all of us to let our ears be known what our left hand does. Adequate publicity of all subscriptions in the future will rid future "Vigilance Committees" of most of their labors; and adequate publicity will wonderfully assist the present "Vigilance Committees" in the Fourth Liberty Loan to clear the track.

Letters From Our Soldier Boys Over Here and Over There.

Letter from Harry K. Andrews to Lowell Home Folks.

Somewhere in England.

Dear Father and Mother—

I wish I could state when this letter is being written so you could know how long it takes it to reach you, and where I am; but you will have to guess both. We are near one of England's large cities in a large camp through which several thousands of troops pass daily. We are expecting to be ordered out any time.

Our trip "across" was uneventful and even if it had not been, I could not have told of anything that happened.

We were on a very large flat ship containing between 6 and 12 thousand men. I was made "orderly" during the trip, having to be around the officers' quarters from 7:30 a. m. until 9:00 p. m., to carry orders, etc.

After landing, we made a march of 5 or 6 miles to a camp where we stayed one night. The next day we traveled by train and then marched 2 and 3 miles to the present place.

Our packs are heavy, 60 to 70 lbs., containing everything we possess.

Old England looks as one would imagine. The roads are narrow and hard—crushed stone. The houses are always apartments or flats, usually brick, (the soil is mostly clay in England), and are in block lengths. The whole village, in fact the whole country, (and we have been through a good share of it) is composed of the same kind of houses. You can't tell the difference between a dwelling house, a factory and a store in the old villages. Each house or apartment has about 8 chimneys, one for a fireplace for each room probably.

There are few automobiles, mostly American make. Farm work is done by single horses or hitched one ahead of the other or one ahead of two, with a child ridding the foremost. The fields are small with high and thick fences, usually capped with stone. In the south a great deal of hedge is used.

The crops are good. They are harvesting their wheat now. There are practically no barns and the grain is stacked.

Our supper tonight was two hard tack crackers, a piece of cheese and coffee. One needs money to buy things to eat. There is little one can buy, however. There is nothing to sell. The stores are open but a few hours. One needs a ticket to buy a meal down town, and then can get only so much. Everyone is hungry over here. The children all beg us for pennies.

The girls all work; drive trucks, drive and conduct street cars, and even clean city streets besides ordinary factory, office and store work. ALL the English men are in the army. I am sure going to see and learn a lot of the world. Lovingly,


