## DAY IN SHELL HOLE WAR STAMP PRIZES A FEDERAL RESERVE ALL AROUND

Letter from Carl Bank to His Brother Erhart in Lowell. Lee Second.

Sept. 10, 1918.

No doubt you are back in Lowell No doubt you are back in Lowell by this time, so this letter will do for the whole family. As I wrote on the card, I am in the hospital and my wound is healing up fine. I have plenty of time to think of the past, present and future; but I don't like to think of the past, and I'll let the future take care of itself; so the present is all I've got to worry about.

I was told by Major Stewart that Theo was wounded, but I haven't been able to trace him yet. He has been with Battalion Hds. and I

been with Battalion Ids. and I haven't seen him very often.

If you want to hear some of the things that happened to me previous to my entrance into the hospital. It was not to hear state of the distinguished Service Gross and although I don't think I deserve it any more than a good many others, I'll take it in case they decide to thrust it upon me.

It happened this way. We were fighting on the banks of the Veste when thru some mistake our artillery began to drop shells on us. Everybody dropped back, but six of us decided to stay in case Fritzie got the idea in his head he would come across. He got the idea alright but it departed quicker than it entered and so did Fritzie after we began shooting. It wasn't very bleasant to have those shells drop so close.

From the Vesle we went some.

From the Vesle we went some-where left of Soissons and that's where I got mine. The lieutenant in charge of the 1st Platoon was sent away so I was left in command. During the night we had dug in behind a hill, and in the morning the captain sent me word that we were to go over the top at 7 a. m. Promptly at 7 I gave the word to my men to go over. We went. We were met by a hail of machine gun bullets and I was yelling to the men to get more

interval, when the man beside me went down and the bullet that went thru him passed into my thigh. They (meaning the Boche) were shooting from the flank and front men were dropping right and left.
For about one-half a kilometer I
limped after my platoon, but I
couldn't catch up so I dropped into
a shell hole and bandaged up my
wound. After about fifteen minutes,
I looked over top and found to my
dismay that I was all alone, our men
having fallen back to their former
positions while I was dressing my an inch of my head the whole German army picked on me. Anyway that is the way it seemed to me, the bullets came so fast and thick. The Germans have high-powered telescopes attached to their machine guns. It made me so mad to think they could keep me there that I'm afraid I used language I had never acquired in my vocabulary at High school. I took a smoke and settled down for half an hour and at the end of that time looked up again. One look was enough, and I began to get that empty feeling. The Boche, about a hundred of them, were less than 200 yards away and coming towards me. I loaded my pistols and waited. I wasn't excited. What was the use? I knew that if my time had come there would be an inch of my head the whole Germy time had come there would be at least five Fritzies in the same boat with me. I was going to wait untile they were 50 yards from me and then let them eat 45's. But something happened. Somebody must have been holding a horsemust have been holding a horseshoe for me because they stopped a
hundred yards off and turned back.
That empty feeling in my stomach
disappeared and I began to feel better. But I couldn't get out for the

until dark and then take a chance
on being plugged from our troops
by mistake. All day I lay in that
hole, my wound burning and smarting and it seemed to me that the
sun always stayed in one place. sun always stayed in one place.
When afternoon came it rained
every half hour and the hole I was
in filled with water so that various

parts of my antomy began to feel uncomfortable. I was in a disagreeable state, in mind as well as body, and a dozen times I was tempted to take a chance and crawl back to our lines. But that would have been suicide, so my better judgment prevailed and I didn't give he Boche the satisfaction of shooting me. The afternoon sure went slow. The minutes dragged into hours and the hours into days (old stuff, but true nevertheless) and it stuff, but true nevertheless) and it finally began to rain again. It must have been around five o'clock when I heard the sound of voices coming from the direction of our lines, so I got up and took a peep. This time it was our boys and the old khaki sure looked good to me. Like the Germans, they stopped a 100 yards from me and I heard their captain order them back, so I made up my mind they weren't going back without me. It was raining quite heavily then so when I jumped out Fritz didn't see me. I had gone perhaps 50 ft. without a bullet coming anywhere near me and was beginning to congratulate myself on being clever enough to find the dips and depressions in the ground when zip, zing, zowie they began to hit in front of me, behind me, in fact all around me. Right then and there that same empty feeling came back to my food apparatus and I began to speed up. I kept crawling and crawling for what seemed ages to me, and finally reached the First Aid station covered with mud from head to foot and wet to the skin. Upon inspection of myself, I found that I had no other wound besides that I had received ten hours ago but I did find bullet holes thru my right coat sleeve.

After thinking it over. I'm confinally began to rain again. It must

Well, to go on with the story up to date. After riding in the ambulance all night I arrived at a Field hospital where they fed me ether and used their knives and saws on me. From there I took an ambulance train to Paris, was in the hospital at Neuilly two days, and then put on an ambulance train again. Arrived at U. S. A. B. H. No. I at Vichy and that's where I am at present. I had a drink of the famous Vichy water.

The men in the hospital are all cheerful and good humor prevails in every ward. Shorty, who hasn't any left leg, called to one of the fellows who was up and kindly asked him to bandage his left ankle. Pete couldn't find it. In the hospital at Paris I saw a soldier whose mouth and jaw were taken off. They have to feed him thru his nose, and when I saw him, he was smoking a cigaret thru his nose. Can you beat it?
