### OLD DOCTOR RESTS

Doctor McDannell, Over Half a Century Lowell Servant, Dies.

"Dr. McDannell passed away at 6 o'clock this morning."

Such was the message that carried sorrow into every Lowell home Wednesday morning, a regret that will be shared in hundreds of homes for many miles about the village in which he had been a familiar figure and a faithful public servant for more than fifty years.

The doctor may be said, virtually, to have died in the harness. Saturday evening, while caring for his office practice, he was feeling badly; but Sunday morning went to the office as usual to meet a patient and prepare for his morning rounds. His ill condition was so apparent to his clerk, Miss Mangle, that she advised him to go home and to bed; and he yielded.

Doctors Lee and Barth were called and for a time it was hoped that our old friend would recover; but the end came as stated, and we are left to reflect that not all the good soldiers went to war.

Two of Lowell's doctors having been called into the army service, the past year has been an arduous one for the three remaining physicians. Although Dr. McDannell was in his seventy-fifth year, he responded to the necessities of the times with surprising spirit and energy doing his level best here at home, while younger men went to war and dying at last, like a true soldier, at his post.

Doctor McDannell is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Geo. M. Winegar of Lowell and Mrs. Geo. Arthur Brown of Portland, Ore. Arrangements will depend upon word received from the latter.

### THANKSGIVING PROG'

President Wilson Finds Abundant Reasons for Gratitude This Year.

Washington, Nov. 18.—In a proclamation issued Sunday President Wilson designated Thursday, Nov. 28, as Thanksgiving day and said this year the American people have special and moving cause to be grateful and rejoice. The proclamation follows:

"It has long been our custom to turn in the autumn of the year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His many blessings and mercies to us as a nation. This year we have special and moving cause to be grateful and rejoice. God has in His good pleasure given us peace. It has not come as a mere cessation of arms, a mere relief from the strain and tragedy of war. It has come as a greater triumph of right. Complete victory has brought us, not peace alone, but the confident promise of a new day as well in which justice shall replace force and jealous intrigue among the nations. Our gallant army has participated in a triumph which is not marred or strained by another purpose of selfish aggression. In a righteous cause they have won immortal glory and have nobly served their nation in serving mankind. God has indeed been gracious. We have cause for such rejoicing as revives and strengthens in us all the best traditions of our national history. A new day shines about us in which our hearts take new courage and look forward with new hope to new and greater duties."

"While we render thanks for these things, let us not forget to seek the divine guidance in the performance of these duties and divine mercy and forgiveness for all errors of act and purpose and pray that in all that we do we shall strengthen the ties of friendship and mutual respect upon which we must assist to build the new structure of peace and good will among the nations."

"Wherefore I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the twenty-eighth day of November next, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer and invite the people throughout the land to cease upon that day from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to render thanks to God, the ruler of the world."

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed."

"Done in the District of Columbia this sixteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-third."

### DOCTORS NEED REST

A Word of Caution to Lowell and Vicinity People.

The death of Dr. McDannell leaves Lowell and its large territory with but two physicians to do the work that formerly occupied four or five doctors in ordinary times.

It stands to reason that they can not go night and day without rest, without paying the penalty which would leave us entirely without medical services; and it is needless that their morning rest be unbroken. To this end, people are requested not to call their doctors before 8 o'clock, a. m., unless of course in urgent cases.

A case in point. Monday morning at 5 o'clock when one of the doctors was sleeping after having been out during a considerable part of the night, some one roused him by phone to know if schools would open that day.

The party did not mean to be inconsiderate; he was simply thoughtful. We mention it here to emphasize the importance, under present conditions, of being considerate of our remaining doctors, not only for their good but for that of the public of us well.

### SPANISH INFLUENZA

Don't mix with others at all if possible, except your immediate family.

If we will all do our part and follow these suggestions we shall save many lives.

### UNION PEACE MEET

Splendid Patriotic Program at City Hall Sunday Evening.

Despite the influenza epidemic, a goodly audience assembled at the Lowell City hall Sunday evening in answer to a call for a union Peace service for all the people irrespective of church affiliations.

The hall was beautifully decorated, the committee having done their work well. They had secured all the services obtainable, society, school, church and private ones and these and national flags were hung at intervals on the walls of the hall. The woods scene formed a fine part of the stage, the national colors in hunting seeming to twine among the trees and across the background was stretched a large American flag. Along the front of stage floor were small flags, interspersed with potted ferns in center of which stood a frame containing the pictures of President Wilson, Field Marshall Haig and General Foch and Pershing, and bouquets of white chrysanthemums were also in evidence. Above the flag at the back of stage hung three large cards in black, each containing two gold stars and below, the names in large white letters: Charles Clark, Walter Yelton, Melvin Kingdom, Clarence Roberts, Winifred Alexander and Darwin Dickson. This was the handiwork of Mr. Wadsworth. The chairman and chief push of the decorative committee were W. A. Gillingham and he was ably assisted by M. S. Henry and Vern Ashley.

The spirit of the assembly was in accord with the occasion and its fitting speakers, union chorus, singers and the volunteer band were seated on the platform.

After the band played "The Red, White and Blue," Chairman S. P. Hicks gave a stirring address on the United War Work campaign and The Star Spangled Banner was sung by the chorus choir and assembly.

Rev. A. H. Lash offered a prayer and Rev. Max Lohs read a passage of Scripture.

Walter Yelton, Sterkings, Maynard and Sissen sang "We'll Never Let Our Old Flag Fall," and Mrs. E. S. White followed with a recitation, "Old Glory," which was delivered with spirit and was well received.

Rev. Max Lohs played a mandolin solo with such effect that he was heartily encored.

Rev. A. H. Lash then delivered a rousing victory address, which was heartily applauded, and was followed by Messrs. Clark, Yelton and Hicks and Miss Maynard in a fine trio, the appropriate words of which were written by Mr. Hicks, as follows:

We sing the glory of our nation,  
Of battles we have won for liberty,  
Of the victories of her soldiers and her sailors,  
Won in lands beyond the mighty sea,  
How brave boys answered when she called them,

### INFLUENZA GAINS: 47 DEAD IN STATE

1,193 New Cases Reported to State, 212 in Bay City.

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 18.—The latest count of influenza cases shows a decided increase, as 1,193 new cases and 47 deaths were reported to the state board of health Monday.

According to Dr. Richard M. Olin, secretary of the board, the situation at Bay City is more serious than in any other city. Bay City reported 212 new cases of influenza Monday. Drastic orders have been issued by the local board of health closing every factory, school, church, theater and other places of business in Bay City with exception of groceries, which are permitted to remain open from 8 to 12 a. m.

Grand Rapids reported 102 new cases, Detroit 93, Pontiac 78 and Kalamazoo 21. The other cases are scattered throughout the various counties.—Detroit Free Press.
