



Obituary-F. G. Hoffman.



Frank G. Hoffman died at Red Cross hospital in Grand Rapids, Friday morning, after an illness of four days with pneumonia, aged 71 years. Funeral services were held at his late home here at 10, a. m., Saturday, Rev. W. M. P. Jerrett officiating; burial at Oakwood cemetery, with comrades of the G. A. R. acting as pall bearers.

Mr. Hoffman was born at Auxburg, Bavaria, Germany, Dec. 1, 1847, and came to America with his parents in 1857; and they settled in Suspuehanna, Pa., where he spent his boyhood days.

March 17, 1867, he enlisted in Company E., Second New Jersey Volunteer Infantry at Elizabethtown, N. J., for one year, during the war; and was sent to the front at Petersburg and from there to Danville, Va., Returned to Richmond and back to Appomattox. After Lee surrendered, he was in the grand parade at Washington and was honorably discharged June 11, 1865, He afterward learned the machinists' trade in Cleveland.

On the 8th of October, 1875, he was married to Sophia Jenson of Lincoln, Ill. Three children were born to them: A. W. and Charles of Lowell and Mrs. A. Wood of Grand Rapids, all of whom survive. The mother died Oct. 20, 1904, and in 1906 Mr. Hoffman married Mrs. Agnes Leonard, who with her faith-





HOLDING THE FUEL BAG

All fuel bans and regulations are of. Dr. Garfield retires to his college amid ironic applause indicating a hope that he has learned something; certainly the country paid heavily enough in money and discomfort for his education as fuel administrator.

A woeful citizen, who used to be an advocate of government ownership, said to The Press the other day that everything the government had taken charge of had cost more. That is pretty nearly true of the fuel situation, too, with the single exception of anthracite, and we were allowed little or no anthracite but placed instead at the conscienceless mercy of the coke producers.

Urged on by the government as a patriotic duty local dealers in the middle west loaded up last fall with coke, slate briquettes and the poorer grades of soft coal available. These very dealers are now left holding the hear and facing a loss. The con-

The consumer is pretty apt to grin cheerfully when he hears that a coal dealer is stuck, but in this case the burden falls upon the men who do not deserve it. Under the regulations the retail dealers were allowed a margain of only so much her ton. a margain of only so much per ton, no matter how high priced the fuel might be, and the coke producers secured the payment of their blood money profits long ago, leaving the retailer to get out of his present predicament as best he may.







Girard, of Ionia, who was killed in action at Chateau Thierry, have written to Howell commending the plan of naming a Howell street in his honor. The memorial was signed by 3½ officers of the One Hundred and Twenty-sixth infantry, including Majors Norris, Rankin, Kathcart and Captains Gansser, Burke and Myers. It refers glowingly to the gallantry of the dead captain, also stating that he had a premonition of death which failed to deter him.
