





> New Victory Seed Oats To the Oat Growers in Michigan: For the season of 1914 I reserved through the Hickox-Rumsey Co., of Eatavia, N. Y., five bushels of seed oats direct from Sweden under seat. This variety was carefully tested out on my farm in comparison with Swedish select (three years from Garton's re generation) and the Johnson oats, the latter being one of the best varieties I have ever grown. In comparison the imported oats were at least 25 per cent better in yield than the grains above mentioned. For the season of 1915 I grew 40 acres of the New Victory Oats and secured a yield of a fraction over 100 bushels per acre. The season of 1914 a heavy windstorm in July laid much of the oats of other varieties flat; the New Victory Oats were unaffected. In 1915 when all oats were bady lodged, the New Victory stood up well, one of the fields yielding 125 bushels per acre. I furnished the Michigan Agricul this oats for testing in their test plots in 1915. For checking purposes there was planted alongside of this sample the highest yielding variety for the past five years by 23 per cent as determined on the college grounds. With this check planting on each side of the sample furnished by me, the yield of the latter was in advance of the checks above mentioned. Jas. N. McBride.

Any plan for building good roads is absolutely! worthless unless it embraces a plan for constant maintenance which, in the long run, is the only sure and economical plan

for furnishiing the state with good highways. The automobile is no longer a plaything; it is a business proposition. It opens hitherto undreamed of breadths of vision and industry to the farmer and the free circulation of automobile passenger and freight traffic is more essential to life and growth of the community than the operation of steam railway trains and interurban lines."

Roads An Important Link. "In the big war, the roads were as much a necessary part of the scheme of transportation as the railway and the steamship. The same argument applies with equal force to commerce and industry, except that it is fartherreaching and more permanent in its benefits. If you break down one link in a chain; the whole chain goes. The time is here when the roads must form a most important link in the

chain of transportation." Ashamed of Michigan's Roads. "Take Michigan today. It is the cen-

ter of the world's automobile industry, yet it is notorious for its bad roads. Tourists in the east will tell you they land. want to come to Michigan's greatest play-ground of the nation, but the Ledge. pleasure would be more than offset by the trouble and expense of traversing

endless mileage of roads that do not deserve to be dignified under that land.

"When I hit Michigan on the way home from war, it was a great shock to me to behold some of the black, muddy, impassable highways, after my experience with the hard, glistening, white highways of France. And after my experience and observations overseas, I am a booster for better roads for Michigan.

Not for war purposes, but for the upbuilding and growth of our great commonwealth. And I cannot but feel that others in Michigan who were not fortunate enough to get into the fight "over-there" will learn the lesson from their fighting men and begin the construction of a highway system, that will be maintained and properly and plainly marked and will meet with the approval of the Wolverine soldiers who fought over French roads and
