

Lowell Boys in Northern Russia

Parents and friends of Lowell and cicinity boys who spent last fall and winter in the Arctic region of Northern Russia will rejoice to know that they are soon to be re-

leased.

The Grand Rapids News has this:
Once again the war department
announces the withdrawal of the
American forces from north Russia. American forces from north Russia. These forces were made up largely of Michigan and Wisconsin men, members of the 339th infantry, which was organized at Camp Custer. The forces also include the 310th engineers, the 337th ambulance company and the 167th and 168th mater. company and the 167th and 168th motor transport companies. The war department does not advise us as to the exact date on which the Russian expeditionary forces will sail for home, but we may expect that date to be early in June.

The American soldiers were sent to Russia last September. The first

to Russia last September. The first official word we had of their disofficial word we had of their dispatch was contained in a brief announcement, telling of their arrival at Archangel. They have seen considerable fighting, although most of the campaigns have been in the nature of guerilla work. Letters from Grand Rapids and other Michigan men have described this method of warfare, which continued despite the signing of the armistice in November. The conditions under which the Yankees fought in north Russia were explained in an editorial in The News several weeks ago. They were not healthy, and it is no wonder one company of the 339th regiment mutinied.

Newspapers have persistently demanded a return of the Americans from north Russia. At last their demands are being met. It may have

mands are being met. It may have been impossible to bring the troops home sooner, as spring is just begin-ning in that all but Arctic region.
