## BUSINESS MEN'S LOWELL PICNIC

ABLE ADDRESS BY W. H. EASTMAN, OF GRAND RAPIDS.

M. N. Henry Elected President. Base Ball, Lowell 6, Lake Odessa 1. Next Meeting at Clarksville. The picnic of the Merchants' Mutual Benefit Association was held at the West Side park, Lowell, Thursday, July 24, with a good attendance. The Middleville delegation was accompanied by the five Middleville band which contributed much to the afternoon's pleasure.

After the picnic and a concert by the band the assemblage was called to order by Village President Henry who gave an excellent address of welcome and presented to the officers the big key to the village of Lowell symbolizing their welcome to our hearts and homes.

E. F. Blake, of Middleville, president of the Association, responded briefly to the welcome and accepted the key gracefully, promising to see that N. C. Thomas, of Caledonia did not get it, because he wanted the people of Lowell to feel safe and secure. The address of the day was given by W. H. Eastman, of Grand Rapids, assistant district attorney representing the League to enforce peace. He made a powerful plea for the League of Nations, clarifying the situation to the satisfaction of many and demonstrating to all—at least—his own stalwart Americanism.

After more music by the Middleville band, a business meeting of the Association was held in the Council room of the City hall and the following officers were elected: President—M. N. Henry, of Lowell. Secretary-Treasurer—Charles E. Brown, of Alto.

Vice-presidents—D. G. Look, Lowell; M. Leonard, Clarksville; L. B. Wolcott, Freeport; W. H. Watts, A. B. Colby, McCords; M. Shellenborn, Lake Odessa; E. F. Blake, Middleville; H. G. Stanton, Caledonia; M. A. Benson, Saranac; M. G. G. of Woodland.

M. T. LaMonte, of Clarksville, extended an invitation to the Association to hold an evening meeting in that town in September. Invitation accepted.

Mr. Hammond, of the State Dry Goods Men's Association, addressed the M. M. B. Association and signed up the dry goods' men present. Base Ball, Lowell 6, Lake Odessa 1. In the meantime a fine game of base ball between the Lowell and Lake Odessa teams was progressing at Recreation park in the presence of a large and enthusiastic crowd.

Through the early part of the game the teams seemed very evenly matched, neither side scoring until the last half of the fourth inning when Lake Odessa got a man in. Lowell tied the score in the next inning when Brezina came in on errors. Then neither side scored until Lowell's half of the eighth, when following one run made on errors, with the bases full McQueen rapped out a blinger in a two base hit and drove in three runs. Weeks followed with a single and McQueen came home—five scores.

As they were staging a great comeback in the box, striking out 17 men. Lindquist for the visitors pitched a good game too, striking out 9 men, but lost out on wild throws to first.

## LAO DROWNS IN GRAND RIVER

Cecil Hawley Loses Life in Attempting River Crossing.

Grand River claimed another victim Sunday in the person of Cecil Hawley, son of Alie Hawley, of Keene, who was drowned while swimming near the Kerkes place east of Lowell that morning.

Accompanied by Alva, 12-years-old son of L. Pinkney, he went to the river about 8 o'clock that morning and was attempting to swim across the river, when, without a cry of warning or apparent struggle he disappeared from sight of his companion, who was unable to swim and could give no assistance.

The younger lad seemed dazed by the calamity and returned to his home, reporting the matter, however, to some one he met, and the alarm was given.

Soon after securing the return of the Pinkney lad to locate the place, the body was recovered by Ray Hand, Harvey Haysner and Ed. Walker about the noon hour. Justice A. M. Andrews was called but decided that an inquest was unnecessary and Undertaker J. B. Yetter took charge of the body.

Cecil was nearly 15 years old and was becoming his father's right-hand man on the farm. The loss and shock are a heavy blow to his parents and his sister, Mrs. Gain Bangs, Jr.

Cecil R. Hawley, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Hawley, was born November 27, 1904, and passed away July 27, 1919, at the age of 14 years and 8 months. He leaves to mourn his loss, his father and mother, one sister, Hazel E. Bangs, of Pontiac, one half brother, Howard E. Hawley, of Grand Rapids and other relatives.

He was always of a cheerful disposition, loved by his boy friends and will be missed by all.

Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday at 2 o'clock p. m. Rev. A. H. Lash officiating, burial at Pinkney cemetery.

For the regular Thursday afternoon half-holiday game, the strong team from Smyrna will appear at Recreation park for a friendly contest with Lowell's good team.

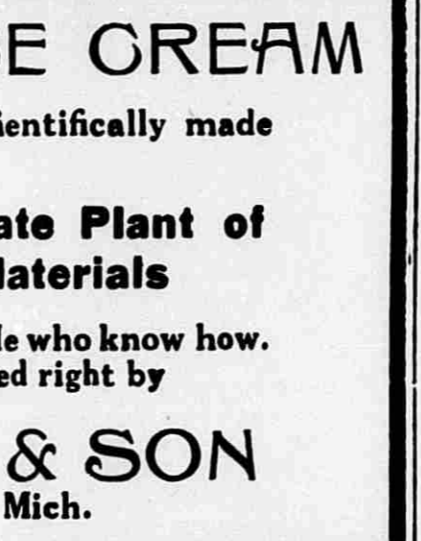

## KENT CO. GOOD ROADS SECOND

Engineer Whiting Tells of Big Gain. Sixty-five Miles Concrete to be Finished This Year.

Kent county is making rapid strides with her good roads, and they are roads of which any community might well be proud. Kent county Good Roads Engineer Whiting is authority for the following interesting facts:

"It is only four years since the first mile of concrete road was laid in the county, that was the mile south of Burton street on the south Division avenue road. Since that time not a minute has been lost, and with the exception of a few of the less important roads in the northern part of the county, practically all the trunk lines are at first class shape at the present time.

Sixty-five Miles of Concrete Roads By Fall.  
"At the beginning of 1919 there were already constructed 35 miles of concrete roads. By this fall between 30 and 35 miles more will be completed, making a total of 65 to 70 mile of roads that are unbeatable.

"The Byron Center road was completed this last week and will be open for travel as soon as it hardens sufficiently, which will be in three or four weeks. Several other stretches of road under construction are nearing completion and will be open before winter sets in.

"The \$300,000 appropriated for the state for good roads construction will be used largely for filling in the gaps in the existing trunk lines, and inasmuch as Kent county is pretty well fixed in this way, it is not likely that it will benefit greatly from this source at the present time. However, all plans for the use of this money are not yet complete, and it is quite possible that a portion of it may be set aside for the development of roads in the northern part of the county. The first care will be to complete all roads now under course of construction. The Grand Rapids-Holland road is concrete as far as the county line at Jensen. From this point it is possible that the state appropriation will provide for the construction as far as Holland.

At the present time, revenue for road construction is provided through the following means: A one-half mill tax authorized every fall by the supervisors. The Kent county share of the automobile tax. The state reward for roads built above a certain specified standard. The Government act, by which percentage of cost is carried by petitioners for road to be carried post properties owned by them.

Kent County Stands Second.  
"At the present time Kent county stands second in Michigan for improved good roads. Wayne county is first, with 200 miles of concrete roads—the result of several years of building. At the present rate of construction, it will only be a matter of a few years before Kent county has 100 per cent of good roads—the kind of roads that will last for many years without wearing out—the kind of roads that are really cheap and economical.

"It is estimated that this year about \$700,000 will be expended on good roads in the county. Concrete roads cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000 a mile to construct, according to location and the amount of grading to be done.

Concrete Roads Wear Best.  
"As regards wearing qualities, the oldest concrete road in Michigan is Woodward avenue in Detroit, which has been laid ten years, and is still in splendid shape. Other roads, in Ohio, I believe, have been down as long as 15 and even 25 years, and are still good for many more years of service. The concrete road is the only economical way to lay it; the only road that will stand up under the present hard usage in the shape of motor trucks and the fast-moving lighter machines.

Vans Sum Was Needed to Put Aircraft Manufacturing Industry on Production Lines... By Edward B. Clark.

Washington—Congress has approved \$400,000,000 through the army supply bill for the use of the air service. This is not as much money as the army asked, but it will enable the service to keep up its equipment with a fairly strong personnel, and will enable the United States probably to have airplanes enough for an ordinary emergency.

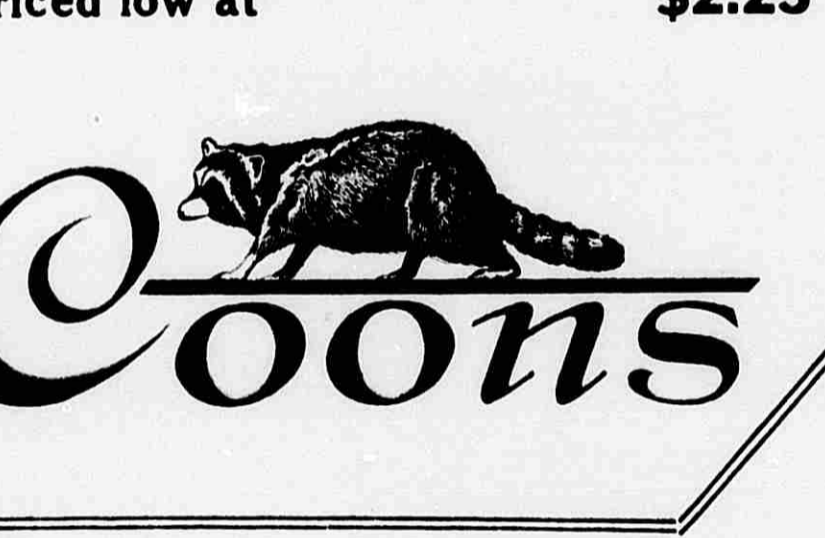

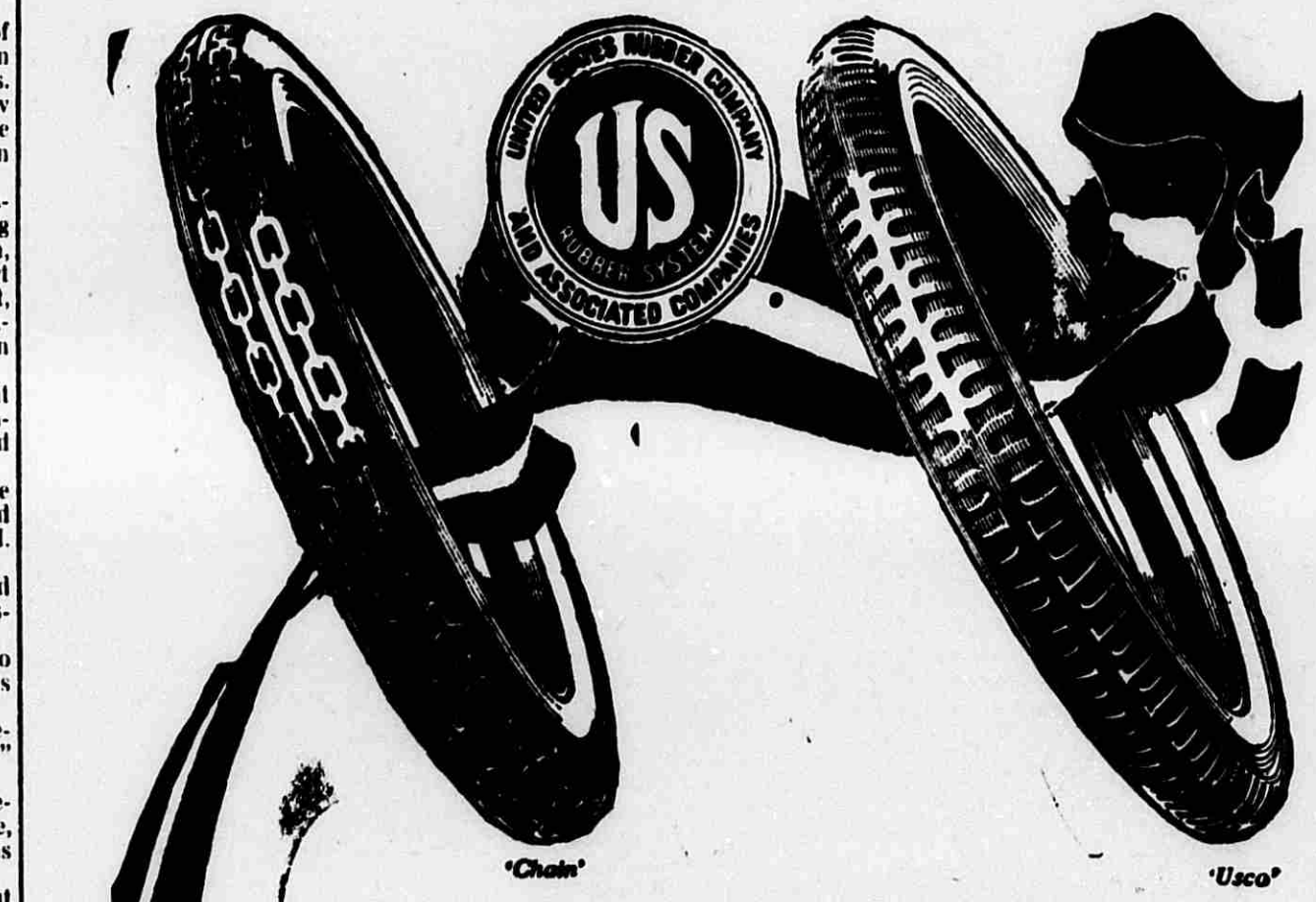
