Sixty-five Miles Concrete to be Finished This Year.

Kent county is making rapid strides with her good roads, and they are roads of which any community might well be proud. Kent County Good Roads Engineer Whiting is authority for the following interesting facts:

"It is only four years since the first mile of concrete road was laid in this county. That was the mile south of Burton street on the south Here is the Lowell line up; D. Division avenue road. By Fall. "At the beginning of 1919 there were already constructed 35 miles booked to play here Thursday Auof concrete roads. By this fall between 30 and 35 miles more will be Nashville wants a series of games. Other towns want to arrange for completed, making a total of 65 to 70 mile of roads that are unbeatable.

"The Byron Center road was completed this last week and will be open for travel as soon as it hardens sufficiently, which will be in three or four weeks. Several other stretches of road under construction are nearing completion and will be

open before winter sets in. The \$50,000,000 appropriated by he state for good roads construcion will be used largely for filling n the gaps in the existing trunk ines, and inasmuch as Kent couny is pretty well fixed in this way, it s not likely that it will benefit greatly from this source at the present time. However, all plans for he use of this money are not yet complete, and it is quite possible hat a portion of it may be set aside for the development of the roads in the northern part of the county. The irst care will be to complete all oads now under course of construc-The Grand Rapids-Holland

At the present time Kent county stands second in Michigan for im proved good roads. Wayne county is first, with 200 miles of concrete roads—the result of several years of building. At the present rate of construction, it will only be a mat-ter of a few years before Kent couny has 100 per cent of good roadshe kind of roads that will last for many years without wearing outthe kind of roads that are really heap and economical.

"It is estimated that this about \$700,000 will be expended on good roads in the county. Concrete roads cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000 a mile to construct, accordng to location and the amount of grading to be done

Concrete Roads Wear Best. "As regards wearing qualities, the ldest concrete road in Michigan is Woodward avenue in Detroit, which has been laid ten years, and is still in splendid shape. Other roads, in Ohio, I believe, have been down as long as 15 and even 25 years, and are still good for many more years of hard service. The concrete road s the only economical road to lay; t is the only road that will stand up under the present hard usage in the shape of motor trucks and the fastnoving lighter machines.

"That these roads are going to mprove conditions in the community is a foregone conclusion. Farmers will be able to market more of their produce for less money, and the consumer should benefit by this fact. Good roads are a boon to everyone in their vicinity."—[Grand Rapids Herald.
