

August 21 in Schenck's Grove. The Ledger is indebted to William Farrell, the aged secretary of the Ada Pioneer Association for the following notice and pioneer sketch to which we are glad to give space. The Ada pioneers always give their guests a good time and this year will

prove no exception.
The Ada Pioneer Association and the adjoining towns in the Grand river valley hold their annual basket picnic at Schenck's grove in the village of Ada, August 21, 1919. The program for this year will be espe-cially interesting. Speakers will tell of the early history of the Grand River valley which was settled in the 30's and early 40's by the most honest, industrious and intelligent people that ever blessed this earth

The place where the picnic will be held is historic as being the first place in northwestern Michigan that was settled by a white man. The Honorable Rix Robinson settled here in 1821. The life of this pioncer was strange and eventful. Michigan at that time was an unbroken wilderness. His nearest neighbor to the north was at Mackinac, two hundred miles, to the east, no near hundred miles, to the east, no near er than Pontiac, to the south at Kal amazoo, a fur trader, and to the

west, no nearer than the Mississippi His Indian name was Was-Nah-Belha, the Indian name for Martin, a fur-bearing animal of great value to which the Indians attributed courage, shrewdness and good judgment. His wife was an Indian princess, the daughter of a great war chief of Ottawas. Her Indian name was Pie-Miss-a-Quat-Qua, meaning flying woman. Her father led the band of Ottawas, Pottawatamis and Chipof Ottawas, Pottawatamis and Chippewas against Fort Duquesne, now Pittsburg, and won the battle from General Braddock. Washington saved the remnant of the army. The Indians were under the French control at that time. After the fall of Quebec they wore the red instead of the buff and the blue. Pontiac, the great Ottawa chieftain, was conspicuous in that battle. Later on these same chieftains led their Indian brayes through the wilderness dian braves through the wilderness of Michigan, Pennsylvania and through New York to the head wat-ers of the Hudson and Lake Champlain to join Sir John Burgoyne, who was at that time menacing New England. Judging rightly that he was fighting in a lost cause, he returned with his warriors to the old O-Wash-te-Nong, the River of the Red Man. The loss of this battle and the battle of Saratoga paved the







Phosphorus 12-18 lbs. Dry matter On first sight, the amount of fertilizing material in straw seems large, but when one considers that in a 2-8-2

commercial fertilizer it requires 500 lbs. of the material to furnish the 10 lbs. of nitrogen, that it requires 150 lb. sack to supply the phorphus and that it takes 300 to 900 lbs, of fertilizer to provide the potash, the value of straw should be utilized to its fullest extent in adding plant food to the soil.




