Go to Grand Rapids in Aid of Lowell Truckers.

A number of Lowell manufacturers, officials, business men and citizens, namely Charles Doyle, E. H. Bunce, John A. Hart, M. S. Henry, D. G. Look, John Borgerson, E. A. Anderson, J. C. Smith, P. C. Peckham, A. G. Peckham, Arthur Cos, John Andrews, Mont, Bulason and Charles Moore, attended a meeting of the Associated Truck corporation at the United Motor company's plant in Grand Rapids Tuesday evening.

The association is made up of owners and drivers of motor truck lines running out of Grand Rapids to adjacent towns and is to be brought under a central management with a traffic manager in Grand Rapids, with a warehouse receiving and routing station issuing regular bills of lading and insuring all goods in transit.

Lowell being the pioneer town in Western Michigan to have truck service, the new manager, Mr. Chamberlain, called on M. N. Henry, D. G. Look and E. A. Anderson to relate their experiences with Mr. Moore's truck service. All of them agree that it is a distinct advantage to their businesses and to Lowell.

TRUCK TOURISTS STOP AT LOWELL

Furniture City Band Will Play Here September 3.

Lowell Attention! The first annual "Ship-by-truck" tour to be staged under the auspices of the Grand Rapids Association of Commerce and the Grand Rapids Herald is scheduled to leave Grand Rapids Tuesday, September 2 and will stop over in Lowell September 3 from 12:00 noon to 1:15 p. m., long enough to allow the residents of Lowell and surrounding territory to inspect the sturdy trucks on the tour and to allow the array of ship by truck talent which will accompany the tour to expand to the popular merits of shipping by truck and the real purpose of the tour. A fifteen piece band, the best obtainable in Grand Rapids, will accompany the tour and will give a concert in Lowell.

Lee M. Breese, secretary of the Grand Rapids Association of Commerce, who has made an exhaustive study of shipping problems will be one of the principal speakers as will E. J. Zoet. Zoet will take up "Ship-by-truck" problem from a national standpoint and his talk will be based upon data collected by the "ship-by-truck" bureau of his company. Other speakers of equal merit will be announced later and the effort is made to list for a stop-over of the tour as assured of a rare treat.

Practically every make of truck sold in Western Michigan will be represented in the run, dealers and manufacturers alike have put their shoulders to the wheel and are securing its success. The tour is in line with the national movement to promote the use of trucks for short hauls doing away with freight confusion, educating the rural population to the advantages of motor trucks and collect any data as to their cost of operation of motor trucks under actual country road conditions.

The entries have been divided into two classes, trucks carrying full capacity loads and trucks running empty. Official records will be kept of gasoline and oil consumption and of adjustments, repairs and delays making the run in reality a reliability tour.

The tour will cover more than 200 miles passing through Marne, Goopeville, Nunica, Spring Lake, Grand Haven, Muskegon, Casnovia, Kent City, Sparta, Cedar Springs, Rockford, Greenville, Belling, Tonia, Saranac, Lowell, Alto, Freepport, Hastings, Middleville, Moline and intermediate points.

Muskegon has been selected as the noon control for the first day. The night control will be at Greenville, making the distance covered for the initial grand about 110 miles. On the second day the noon control will be at Lowell.

The route to be covered has been carefully selected as to give the trucks a real test and while it consists partly of good roads, there are several long stretches of sand and some hills that will bring out the real metal of the various makes of trucks.

Bins of this nature have been arranged in many sections of the country and have proved to be one of the greatest boosters possible for the motor truck and ship-by-truck movement. There will be many surprises in the nature of souvenirs and stunts. These are all being guarded as jealous secrets and will be "sprung" when the time is ripe. 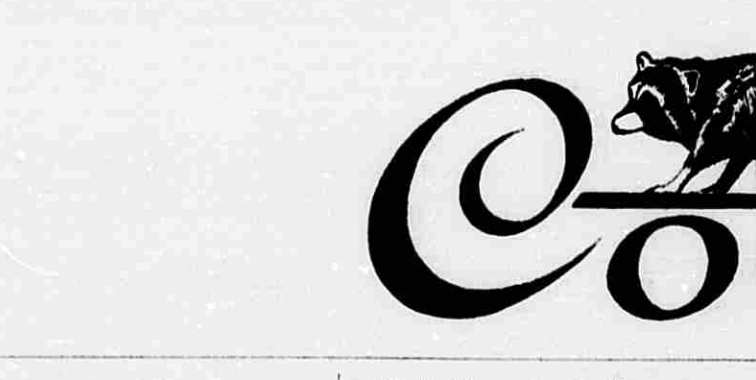
